Council news

Councillor Jim Clark



Council's application for a rate increase has occurred for several reasons. With increases in salary, superannuation and insurance, the capped increase of 3.5% is insufficient to meet even these costs.

Increases above this are needed to cover much needed further spending on infrastructure and services, such as roads, pools, parks and gardens, council buildings, roadside tree management and weed control. Reductions in subsidies from the State Government have also placed further pressure on council resources. The move by some councillors to shift some of these infrastructure costs on to the environment levy means less money would be available for vital environmental projects.

The progress toward a new shire-wide Local Environment Plan will take at least another two and a half years. The LEP provides the planning framework to guide future growth, including potential new release areas at Renwick, Braemar, SW Moss Vale, Willow Vale, Gibbergunyah and East Colo Vale. The controversial nature of some of these developments, as well as smaller proposals in the villages, will be tested by community consultation, decisions of council and final input by the Department of Infrastructure Planning and Natural Resources.

Residents need to make sure they have their say when the LEP is put on public exhibition.

The BCDA at the moment is having a rather introspective time. Apart from our regular activities such as running movie nights, musical events, landscape maintenance etc. we are also carrying out a constitutional review to ensure we continue to meet the requirements of our articles of incorporation and that the constitution remains an evolutionary document that will meet the changing needs of our association. New town signs are at present in the final stages of design. We have secured funding from Council, Bundanoon Sandstone has generously offered assistance with the project and we are currently making decisions about locations at both the north and south approaches to our town.

The Soldiers Memorial Hall now has a factory-reconditioned Kawai 'semi-concert grand'. The proprietor of the Mosman Piano Showroom offered to assist when he heard that money for a piano was being raised through community donations and the proceeds of concerts held in Bundanoon. He offered to reduce the price and agreed to a delayed settlement for the balance. A gala performance will be held in November where we will hear this beautiful instrument played by music lovers and professional musicians.

Garden Club – green thumbs, dirty knees

It's Thursday morning in once-sleepy
Bundanoon and I can't find a parking spot. After two circuits of the block I'm parked at the Bakery to go to the Post Office. As I pass the Hall corner I suddenly realise - it's the first Thursday of the month and the Garden Club is in session. A peek in the door reveals the early arrivals milling around the library. Gardening books are exchanged and borrowed from the comprehensive collection, now numbering 130, and soon to be increased with funds raised at a book sale in June. The display table reveals a wonderful yellow begonia, a potted fuschia, and a bowl of beautiful Pat Austen roses to be admired. The trading table is busy this morning as members espy that elusive treasure for their own garden, or share their excess produce. After half an hour of these preliminaries and early morning cups of tea or coffee the meeting gets under way.

The original 40 members were an energetic group who worked hard to establish the Remembrance Garden beside the Memorial Hall and planted the railway embankment opposite the hotel. When changes were made to the main street, crabapple trees which they had planted were moved to the school. The club was revitalized during Norma Waldon's three-year term as president. Marina Beaumont took over from her and has just been re-elected for her third year. The membership now stands at 160, and 80 or 90 people regularly attend monthly meetings. Residents who have recently arrived in Bundanoon and district see joining as a comfortable way to become part of the community and to learn something of the special requirements of cold-climate

gardening. There is a speaker at most meetings with topics ranging from bulbs, roses, trees and shrubs to garden art and design. Picnics and trips away, garden inspections and social functions provide further opportunity to meet and exchange ideas.

Working bees held in March and May have made a significant improvement to the Information Bay and the embankment opposite the hotel. 1500 bulbs were planted in record time at the Information Bay and by the end of May there they were with the added surprise of an inexplicable flower!

Maintenance of the native garden on the railway embankment is something of an historical obligation. The garden is the result of at least 15 years of hard work by the Garden Club, BCDA, the general community... and the birds love it! Again, the results of a few

hours' work by 23 people, pruning and weeding, helped to tame this overgrown area.

A focus group of BCDA is making steady progress towards the erection of new sandstone signs for Bundanoon on both approaches to town. Designs have been accepted and when Council and Government regulations have been adhered to the work will commence.

BCDA annual report by Danien Beets

The BCDA has, in the last year, continued to vigorously pursue its endeavours and carry out work to strengthen and foster our community spirit.

Autonomous sub-committees within BCDA are made up of people who have a passion for a particular aspect of our community. We provide the framework, advice, finances, and volunteers for their activities.

Our sub-committees have covered a broad spectrum of community involvement in the past year; from making the hall a viable and desirable venue to use, to staging events in the hall; from managing and maintaining some of the public landscape areas through town to opening private gardens. We also produce this magazine four times a year which reflects the interests of people in the area as well as promoting local businesses.

We are also realising some long-term goals:

A grand piano has been purchased, primarily from the fundraising efforts of Arts Bundanoon. The Bundanoon Community Quilt has been completed and plans for a public exhibition space are being prepared to be incorporated into a possible new foyer for the hall.

We are carrying out a constitutional review to ensure the long term viability of our organisation and its structure and we continue to explore new ways to attract new members with diverse interests to join us.

Local government is increasingly valuing our opinion, asking for our comment, and inviting our involvement in planning the direction of Bundanoon.

BCDA has this year had representation and involvement in:

- the Shire Council's Bundanoon Masterplan Committee
- the Consultation phase of the Bundanoon Sewer Augmentation Project
- the location of the Telstra mobile phone
- · Southern Highlands Business Chamber
- · Southern Highlands Rail Users Group, and
- Negotiations with various development proposals for our town.

Despite this, unfortunately not all residents in our town agree with or support our actions. Sometimes it would be easier to either agree with detractors or alternatively sidestep a criticism. I urge every member of the BCDA to enter into dialogue with Bundanoon people about our endeavours and decisions and encourage them to join our association. I see dialogue as critical to ensuring that we represent both our members' views and that of the wider community. I hope that our monthly meetings continue to be a place for lively discussion and a valued community forum for all Bundanoon to use.

With the expected installation of two new projectors in the projection booth of the hall, our movies will continue to be shown with improved picture, sound and reliability. Construction of a new foyer for the hall will enhance the space as well as providing a display of the Community Quilt which will be visible through the main doors.

Our Garden Ramble was a great success last year and will become an increasingly prominent date on the Bundanoon calendar. Revenue from this event, allocated to the Green Team. provides funds for maintenance, rehabilitation and revitalisation of public landscaped areas.

The BCDA's concert series will continue to bring us a diverse and high quality calendar of recitals and performances.

Many other ideas and projects exist as seeds just waiting for the right people to take them up, nurture them and let them grow into activities and events that foster and enhance our local community:

- Bundanoon Recipe Book
- Bundanoon Motor Museum
- The big Bundanoon BBO
- The Bundanoon World Music Festival
- The Bundanoon Card
- The bridge to bridge pedestrian and cycleway.

I would also like to see more interest in our National Park facilities. We tend to take the park for granted. We have not lobbied National Parks and Wildlife or Council regarding any aspect of the park, apart from the Glow Worm Glen Track. I would like to invite the local NPWS representative to a meeting this year to talk to us about the park, the work carried out here and the role of the community.

The BCDA is a valued asset in Bundanoon and we are united in our love of our town and its character. With the continuation of a sound financial position and the commitment of our members we will remain a valid and cherished organisation within the community.

Stop the rail cuts

The Soldiers' Memorial Hall in Bundanoon was full to overflowing on Sunday 29 May, as villageers came out in force to hear about the proposed cuts to the passenger rail service.

Dell Dempster, the president of SHRUG (Southern Highlands Rail Users Group), spoke about the work they have done and pointed out that there had been little support until now from the villages - a point conceded by many who spoke from the floor.

The meeting agreed to work with SHRUG to fight the drastic cuts and passed quite a few motions, including a planned community protest train trip to Sydney to discuss our specific issues with the Minister and strengthening links with other railway protest groups.

There was agreement that everyone must now play an active role to bring about change and not leave it to a few.



New Projectors At 'The The Empire Update

The Kid Stakes was the last film to be shown at the Rex. (Bundanoon Memorial Hall), using the 1928 projectors which had been meticulously restored and maintained by projectionist Charles Slater. First used in Bundanoon in 1933, they are to be replaced by more recently restored modern projectors from Ouirindi at the bargain price of \$2500. Council has given an interest-free grant for this amount to the BCDA to make the purchase. One of the old projectors will go on permanent display in the hall.

Extensions to the Empire Cinema in Bowral are well and truly complete. Two very comfortable new cinemas are now operating, along with the two existing ones and there is a new box office and snack bar. Particularly welcome is the lift, making access to films so much easier for the elderly, those with disabilities and stroller-pushing parents. The décor is bright and cheery, necessitating a makeover for the, now 'tired' by comparison, original cinema areas. This upgrade will take place during winter.

Times past at Penrose

local history

We like to think that places have a unique character, something that rubs off on people who inhabit that locality; the longer they are there the more noticeable it is. Even the ancient Romans had a term for it – 'Genius Loci' or 'Spirit of Place'. Penrose still has a genuine country quality about it and locals have that unaffected and friendly bush temperament.

One of my small projects since settling here has been to talk to long-time residents, take down their stories and copy family photographs, if they have them, so that I can visualise the people and places as they were.

Cynics might suggest nothing much ever happens at a place like this, but you would be surprised. There are stories about bumper crops and bushfires, higher annual rainfall, the worst drought and horrendous hail storms. These were times when the district was carpeted in orchards, the era of steam trains, 'plane crashes and men and boys going away to wars. There was the occasional feud, and tales of interesting, terrible and wonderful characters who lived here at one time or another. Through all these events support of friends and neighbours in hard times is a common thread.

There is something intriguing in hearing about past events and circumstances that in various ways contrast to our own moment in time. Perhaps we don't learn to behave better from past example but we can appreciate our comparative material comforts. On the other hand it is surprising how many old folk look back fondly on a period in their lives when they had to walk great distances, endure physical hardships, and many families often barely survived on the edge of rural poverty.

Sunday breakfast – good for the soul, bad for the waistline.

Muesli is a great way to start the day during the week but Sunday offers an opportunity for indulgence. Eggs are a tempting treat at the weekend and scrambled, served with one of a variety of accompaniments they are simple, nutritious and above all they taste good.

Smoked salmon goes well with eggs. Asparagus blanched for a few minutes in boiling salted water, drained and refreshed in cold water then topped with shaved parmesan cheese makes an elegant dish.

Mushrooms finely sliced and tossed with baby spinach leaves and a sprig of rosemary in browned butter for a few minutes are a taste sensation, especially when fresh ricotta is crumbled into the pan just before serving. Of course you could go out! Penrose Village Shop and Café has undergone some significant changes recently. It's difficult to resist the 'big breakfast' on a cold Sunday morning.

Eggs, any style, are on offer with hash browns, grilled tomatoes, bacon, sausage and mushrooms.

Thick slices of toast, butter, and little pots of marmalade and berry jam are brought to the table, served on a tray, and although there's not long to wait there's nothing wrong with making a start! Coffee is hot and if you have one with a little piece of toast you won't spoil your appetite. Make sure you leave room for a second cup and have a chat with Roberto to find out what else he and Bill have in mind for their new venture at Penrose.

Scrambled Eggs

Use a heavy, non-stick pan. Allow 2 or 3 freerange eggs per person. Whisk them with a little milk or cream and salt and pepper. Don't worry about the fat content it's 9.30 and you can eat salad for lunch.

Chop some herbs (parsley is most popular but chives or basil make good alternatives) to enhance the flavour of the dish.

Gently melt a good knob of butter (20 g to 3 eggs) and when it is just starting to sizzle tip in the well-beaten eggs. Stir gently and continuously over a low heat with a wooden spoon until eggs have just started to form creamy curds. Add herbs and while the mixture is still creamy remove from heat and cover with a lid for a minute or two. Stir once more and serve on freshly made buttered

The adventurous taste buds were well catered for with a range of traditional Highland culinary delights including haggis, blood pudding, square sausage and the more appealing famous Scottish Shortbread. There was also plenty of opportunity for those wishing to research their family heritage and history with Scottish Clan and Society tents around the oval willing to explain the detail of the clan colours and the history of the clan. We were fully booked and our Highland Dinner was a roaring success. Local identity and expert fiddler Bob McGuiness kept everyone entertained well into the evening. As the sun rose on Sunday morning there were a few sore heads around town but they still managed to remember to book their accommodation for the 8th April next year.

This months recipe of 'Cranachan' is a delicious dessert to enhance the Scotsman in you.

Ingredients - Serves 4

4 tbsp Oatmeal

50gm Light Brown Sugar

1 thsp clear honey (use heather honey for a traditional Scottish dish) Wee dram of whiskey (use your judgement, although a few thsp will suffice

150ml double cream,

chilled 150ml mascarpone or crowdie cheese

200gm fresh raspberries

Mint leaves for garnish

Scatter the oatmeal and sugar evenly over a roasting tin and toast under the grill. Turn occasionally to brown evenly. Allow to cool completely. Add the honey and whiskey to the double cream and whisk to stiff peaks. Fold in the cheese and most of the oatmeal, reserving a handful for garnish.

Spoon a layer of mixture into serving dishes. Add a layer of raspberries (reserve some for decoration) and top with a further layer of cream. Decorate with the reserved raspberries, oatmeal and a sprig of mint. Feel free to drizzle over another shot of Whiskey, Glayva or Drambuie!

Our base will be Manhattan in the very heart of New York – a city made up of five boroughs (Manhattan/The Bronx/Brooklyn/Queens/Staten Island) and a total population of 19 million people. With only a week we shortlisted the must-dos: take a stroll through Central Park, enjoy a pizza in Greenwich Village, walk across the Brooklyn Bridge (at sunset) and visit icons such as the Empire State Building and the Statue of Liberty.

The True and Outstanding Adventures of the Hunt Sisters

by Elizabeth Robinson, Simon and Schuster 2004

Elizabeth Robinson's first novel was written following the death of her sister, Laurie, and takes an honest look at life, love and the power of the family. She is the producer of a handful of films including *Braveheart*. She worked briefly on a remake of *Don Quixote* which was never completed.

Olivia, a scriptwriter living in Los Angeles has just been sacked from her job, dumped by her boyfriend and 'is working on the fourth draft of a suicide note'


when she receives a call from her father in Ohio. Her younger sister Madeline has leukaemia. Maddie's medical struggles dominate the story but her optimism and idealism help Olivia to continue working on a remake of Don Quixote starring John Cleese and Robin Williams. The book is a compilation of 200 letters and emails, written in airports, from film sets and hospital waiting rooms as she juggles her career and her sorrow. The story swings from tears to laughter as she regales the reader with Hollywood anecdotes, tirades against film executives and doctors. She poignantly captures the reactions of her parents to the devastating diagnosis and the amazing courage of Maddie's husband. Through her writing she explores her relationships with her former partner and her best friend but it is in her 'letters' to her sister that Maddie's fight to live is portrayed. The retelling of the childhood adventures of the Hunt sisters reveals the deep connection they have.


Elizabeth Robinson overcomes the potential for a melodrama with a gift of observation of small detail. How many of us have sat in waiting rooms flicking through magazines, 'so worked over that their paper has become limp as silk', oblivious to the 'ubiquitous TV, high in the corner... waiting... waiting...'.


On a shopping trip to a mall with her mother she tries to discourage her from buying (as she writes to Maddie) a hideous top – "it's South Side. You've been trying to deny that's where you're from all your life; you'll blow it with that top. She really liked it! Big and loud purple flowers, very Polish.'

A tribute, from the author to her parents, at the end of the book ... 'thank you for teaching me to aim high, work hard and to have a sense of humour about almost anything' explains its success on the *New York Times'* best seller list. What could have been a maudlin story is a tribute to the strength of family.

Sidetracked

by Henning Mankel, Vintage 2004

When a girl commits suicide in baffling circumstances, followed by three vicious murders, the tranquil Swedish province of Skåne is shattered.

Inspector Kurt Wallender is challenged by the concept of a serial killer in their midst and the story revolves around his search for connections.

'For a brief moment he felt an indescribable sorrow inside – when he realized that an entirely foreign kind of violence has unfolded in Ystad. The world had both shrunk and expanded at the same time.'

From early in the novel we know the killer's identity and intrigue is built around seeing how this enigmatic detective gets his man. It's a formula that Henning Mankel uses in most of his successful Wallender series of crime fiction. It takes a while to warm to the gloomy, Scandinavian detective but empathy is established as his social and political commentaries are woven into the story; exploitation of young women and corruption in government at the highest levels. His life is complicated by his concern for his ageing father and his wayward daughter, not to mention the trials of establishing a new relationship. This is a gripping drama which was the winner of the Crime Writer's Association Gold Dagger award in 2001.

Henning Mankel is a Swedish writer whose work has been published in 33 countries. He has written eight novels and a collection of short stories. He has received major literary prizes and generated numerous international film and television adaptations. He has also published novels for children and young people as well as being a frequently performed dramatist.

He works in Mozambique where he is head of Teatro Avenida in Maputo.

Harry Hull left a busy career in the futures exchange for a tree change to Bundanoon. His wife Karin raised their children and worked as a school teacher. Joanna Ramage discovers how together they use their skills learned in their home country of South Africa to run Treetops Guest House.

Karin

Harry and I met on April Fools' Day when mutual friends arranged a blind date. Eighteen months later we were married and this year we celebrate our 30th anniversary.

My parents are Austrian and were uncomfortable about the political situation in South Africa where we lived, trying twice to resettle in Vienna before finding paradise in Australia. Their move was a big help and motivation in our decision to join them six months later. Harry got a job at the futures exchange and I brought up our children. We have four children, a wonderful son-in-law and two beautiful grandchildren.

When our youngest son started high school, I went back to casual teaching and two years before we moved to Bundanoon, got a full time job teaching kindergarten at a school in Wahroonga. I revelled in this and can say they were some of my happiest times.

Harry has always wanted to run a bed and breakfast. He is a very loving person who cares very much about people. He's always aware of other people's feelings and very much a family man. Finding Treetops in Bundanoon was for sale seemed perfect – within two hours of Sydney, the maximum distance I was prepared to be away from my babies. Bundanoon just seemed so quiet and lovely.

I think I am a little bossier than Harry. My problem is that I'm a perfectionist, but we have now worked out our job roles – Harry does the shopping and maintenance, and I do the cooking and office work. So far so good!

We have had wonderful and very supportive staff who have stayed with us from the change- over. As some had been at the

guesthouse for many years, they were able to assist us with the moans and groans of an old house.

We are trying to create a home away from home at Treetops – somewhere where guests feel comfortable to read, watch television, listen to music or play a game of backgammon or chess in front of the fire if they choose. For those who want something different, we still host murder mysteries which are very popular. They run through dinner, with the room set up as a night club so there's gambling with monopoly money and dancing. They are often used for hen's nights, for birthdays and Christmas parties. In July we celebrate Yuletide with a sumptuous Yuletide feast and entertainment every weekend. The restaurant, 'The Green Room', is always open to the public, but bookings are essential.

My ideal day away from Treetops is spending the day with our children, which we try to do every two or three weeks.

Harry

I come from South Africa and a little town called Sabie which lies in the Eastern Transvaal. Not far from the game reserve (the Kruger National Park), and perched on the edge of the escarpment, it is a forestry town not unlike Bundanoon. We had been running a guesthouse there for a large corporation and so that was our introduction to the business. In mid-1979, fairly impulsively, we decided we'd come to Australia.

I worked for the futures industry for 20-odd years. I ran the futures floor operation for a number of organisations, finally finishing up at UBS, the highly successful Swiss Bank. When the floor closed and we went from open outcry – the hand signals and the colourful jackets, to computerised trading, I thought it might be time for a change. At first though, I consulted to the Sydney Futures Exchange (the SFE) and the Australian Stock Exchange (the ASX) for a period of time and then, as I had wanted to move the family back into the country for some time, we decided on our "tree change" to Bundanoon.

Treetops was big enough to be a commercial venture, with 23 rooms and a conference facility. One of the original guesthouses in the area, it had operated as such for most of its 90 years.

Karin is the backbone of the business and I'm definitely on the periphery. The hardest thing for Karin has been leaving the children behind but we do enjoy their frequent visits. On the other hand, the best thing about our move has been the reminder of what I remember about growing up in the country. Simple but safe walks or bike rides, and at night, spotting glow worms or wombats in the glen or a look at the heavens without electric lights or pollution to block out the millions and millions of stars in the sky. Hopefully Bundanoon will remain this way – a quiet, (if you like) period town. I hope that nothing too dramatic changes. The village is unique and has a lot of charm. I think sometimes developers lose track of these things.

I'm intrigued that a little town like Bundanoon attracts so many cultural activities and there isn't a week that goes by that such an event is staged in town. Balalaika orchestras, Gilbert and Sullivan functions, string quartets and, for a small town this is wonderful.

Away from Treetops, I'm a trout fisherman and I collect butterflies. I'd like to try and do a bit more of both.... with Karin's permission, yes? Actually, I am the boss in the family and I have her permission to say so.

I think that as we become more involved in community activities, whether it is the Bush Fire Brigade or the Lions Club, hopefully we'll be able to make more of a contribution than we have to date. We are looking forward to being more part of the community. But you've got to earn your stripes and we are still earning ours.

\\I\frac{1}{hat's the greatest hurdle for those leaving high school and entering university life? Unrealistic workloads and impossible assignment deadlines, exam pressure, bewildering new ideas, financial strain? For some maybe, but for Ben and Nathan it's probably food preparation and domestic chores, although financial pressure isn't far behind. Belinda, on the other hand, thinks that organising her work and study time around so many tempting social/ sporting activities and coping with late-night revellers returning home present a huge challenge. All Moss Vale High HSC achievers. they've commenced their university courses at Wollongong this year. Belinda is studying for a Bachelor of Exercise Science and

Rehabilitation, Ben for a Bachelor of Communication and Media Studies/ Bachelor Creative Arts (Journalism) and Nathan for a Bachelor of Science (Physics).

They agree that the main difference between high school and uni is the amount of personal responsibility they must now take on. No one cares if you miss lectures or reminds you to hand work in or tells you how much study is required. It's entirely up to you. Many students get caught out if they lack the self-discipline to ignore the many social distractions


freedom of living away from home. All three readily concede the importance of family support, both financially and emotionally. Initially, making new friends, (and missing old ones) was difficult for all of them too. Wollongong has 1400 students and Moss Vale only 750 but now that lectures, tutorials and clubs have settled into a regular pattern, faces have become more familiar and barriers have tumbled.

Despite these similarities, many of their views and ambitions, (not to mention accommodation), are quite different.

Belinda went straight from high school to uni. "I felt it was important to keep the impetus of the HSC going", she said "I do want to travel, but as I'll only be 23 when I complete this four-year course, I'll be in a better position to do it then." Belinda lives in a student dormitory, Weerona College, only a 20-minute walk from campus and she enjoys the advantage of having no responsibility for cooking and cleaning. A disadvantage is having to cope with lessdisciplined students who arrive back late and loud after a night at the pub! Despite being the recipient of several scholarships, which go towards HECS fees and textbooks, she still relies heavily on support from her Mum and Dad. "I couldn't do it without them". Of her new life Belinda adds, "I miss the personal touch of high school - here you are just a number, but I enjoy being able to organise my work and get on with it, seeking support when I need it from Student Online Services. I'm really enjoying my course and I can still catch up with old friends when I come home for weekends."

Ben took a year off before he started his course. He worked in cafés and at IGA supermarket in Moss Vale for much-needed finances. More importantly for him though was the travelling he did within Australia last year. After 13 years' continuous schooling, "I really needed to do that, to get that sense of independence and to have a break. It gave me the chance to grow up








but he is making new friends now and still maintains links with pals on the Highlands.



Residents want to retain its charm and sleepy character but they also want mod cons like restaurants, doctors, shops, transport, child care and entertainment.

Bundanoon is one of the few areas in the Highlands with land designated for new housing estates and there has been recent

development on the western side of the railway line and in Brigadoon Drive on the eastern side.


Given current zonings and the demand for affordable housing and facilities growth appears inevitable. But can it be managed sensitively? There is concern, for instance, at the size of new blocks off Old Wingello Road in a neighbourhood of larger blocks.

Areas are already zoned for new housing at Erith Street, Bluegum Road and Greasons Road to the west and the Spring Hill property and Governors Road to the east. Medium density development is permitted in parts of Penrose Road and Railway Parade, between Erith Street and Old Wingello Road behind Petersen's Garage, and on a site behind Killarney (Quest for Life).

But there has been a hiccup with sewerage. With the withdrawal of funding by the State Government for expansion of the local sewerage works Wingecarribee Council has placed a moratorium on further subdivisions and villa developments until 2007. This timeframe will be reviewed at the end of this year based on availability of funding and environmental approvals.

A new Local Environment Plan (LEP) –the statutory document which sets the rules for the future development of the whole shire - is currently being prepared and will be exhibited for public comment before being approved. But don't hold your breath – the Department of Planning has sent back council's first attempt at a new LEP after sitting on it for 18 months and council is now re-drafting it. With luck it will be finalized by 2007.

A guide to what the LEP may say about Bundanoon is the council's 2002 Wingecarribee Our Future Strategic Plan. A common theme in the plan is that existing town and village boundaries be maintained to preserve their

But the search is on for a site for an entirely new small town in the Highlands to accommodate population growth after 2011, by which time 800 proposed new lots at Mittagong and Moss Vale are expected to have been exhausted.

As far as Bundanoon is concerned the plan lays down the motherhood objective of "including 'place-based' planning objectives and outcomes (including cultural objectives) that reflect and generally protect existing urban and rural place character, setting and function".

The real nitty-gritty of the plan is contained in the following recommendations:

- Detailed performance criteria and guidelines for existing land release areas to maximise solar access and energy efficiency, ensure good subdivision design and integrate with existing neighbourhoods
- Generally retain the existing minimum allotment standards for residential subdivision (700m² in most areas and 4000m² in others).
- Areas currently zoned Residential 2(b) for villa development to get a new zoning, Residential (Courtyard Housing) which would require more land for each villa (typically 360m² but subject to further study). Possibly car parking requirements for one and two bedroom units will be reduced.
- Rezone the Killarney site in Ellsmore Road from Tourist to Courtyard Housing but also permit tourist facilities.
- Build a town square at Church Street

- · Acquire land for an offstreet public car parking area in the vicinity of Anzac Avenue as funds become available
- · Conduct a feasibility study into a light industrial area in Penrose
- · Rezone land currently zoned Residential near Glow Worm Glen to **Bushland Preservation** with a minimum lot size of two acres
- · Permit mixed residential/retail/commercial development within the proposed Core Business Centre Zone (i.e., strata home units on top of
- · Identify key potential development and redevelopment sites in the business zone and achieve sensitive infill development
- Prohibit department/discount department

The plan acknowledges there is a "backlog issue" in the need for a community centre with a particular emphasis on children's, youth and aged services.

It points to a severe lack of funds to upgrade infrastructure throughout the shire including the Bundanoon sewer upgrade (\$5million) and car parking facility (\$500,000). Less critical infrastructure needs are noted such as drainage upgrades and road and traffic improvements.

As for the rural areas of Bundanoon the minimum lot size for subdivision will remain at 40 hectares. Areas zoned Rural 1 (c) such as the remainder of Greasons Road would have a new residential zoning but the minimum lot size would remain at two acres.

Rural and Environmental Protection zonings would be re-classifed to three new zones - Agricultural and Rural Activities, Bushland Preservation, and Historic Rural Cultural Landscape Conservation. Farming activities would be prohibited and new houses confined to already disturbed areas in Bushland zones, and intensive livestock pursuits and "covered" horticulture would be prohibited in

Owners of 40 ha blocks would be permitted to establish small cafes/refreshment rooms up to 100m2 in floor area as long as they are ancillary to local rural industries (excluding wineries where restaurants up to 250m2 are already permitted).

Working farms would be able to build up to two farm stay cabins (up to six guests in each) while other 40 ha blocks would be allowed one cabin. Guesthouses for up to 12 people would be permitted if "development would result in a net ecological improvement to the land" but only on Bushland-zoned blocks if there is no dwelling house.

The plan also recommends that the clearing of areas of land under five acres be prohibited except for such

approved buildings. It is already prohibited for areas over five acres under the Native Vegetation Act. Genetically-modified crops would also be banned.

By 1873 a railway station had been built and development was based on the production of coal and timber. Cropping and dairy farming followed. Then in the 1880s and 1890s came the churches, post office, school and shops. At the turn of the century tourists from Sydney had begun to discover the "gullies" and by the 1920s there were around 60 guest houses in Bundanoon with most of the guests arriving by train. Some were grand resorts with golf courses but generally they suited a more modest holiday budget.

By the late 1950s the party was over. People with cars had a much wider choice of places to visit and Bundanoon had become too "old fashioned" for the modern-minded tourist of the day. Guesthouses closed their doors and Bundanoon retreated into a sleepy village for two decades until a group of local citizens put it back on the tourist map in the late 1970s with the advent of Brigadoon.







Hot as Hades Above Ground Heaven Below

David Morgan writes here about an outback detour that led to a two-roomed dugout becoming a home-away-from-home for the Smith family of Bundanoon.

Thite Cliffs competes with Tibooburra for the status of the hottest town in outback New South Wales. It's so hot, that the majority of the town's residents live in dug-out caves to escape the searing heat of summer.

Dugout No 9 started life as an opal mine in 1893. When Basil and Kath Smith were first shown it by a friendly opal-miner in July 1990 it had two rooms separated by a hallway. There was no power and no provision for water storage.

Since then they have added rooms at both the top level (-3.5m) and a new lower level (-8m). Extra air shafts have been formed to assist with air circulation and there is electricity and water piped to their new laundry and bathroom situated at the entry level.

To limit the dust in Kath's kitchen, Basil began digging out for their bedroom utilising an existing mineshaft about 8m away. After opening up a working space he jackhammered a slightly vaulted ceiling to the recommended 3m maximum width and then continued down to the floor level. When he had formed the connecting hallway he was delighted to find he was only 50mm away from the X he had painted on the wall of their dugout.

"Whilst forming this hallway," Basil said, "I exposed some brightly coloured opal about the thickness of tissue paper. When, after 360 barrow loads of rock, I hadn't found any more. I decided to leave serious fossicking to my neighbours.

"In fact a nearby neighbour was digging 14m below ground when he came across a layer of pineapples (see adjacent box). They can command five figure amounts if they are of a high quality."

"We often step up onto our old tin roof to watch the sun set and satellites and the occasional comet sometimes make their way across the night sky. The stars are a sight to behold." They say they can still see them from inside where the holes that have been patched with numerous tubes of clear silicon scalant seem to twinkle at night.

"The people here are so friendly and love


to work on community projects just the way we do in Bundanoon. It is truly a homeaway-fromhome." said Kath.



Blue-water racer

No ordinary sailor

Craig Malouf happily makes the regular transition from Highland mists to harbour zephyrs. Craig, a resident of Bundanoon, is a sailor. No ordinary sailor, but the project manager-cum-trimmer/helmsman of a craft that took line honours a matter of weeks after its construction in the 60th anniversary Sydney to Hobart yacht race last December.

Ludde Ingvall's sleek super-maxi Nicorette prevailed in the worst conditions since the 1998 race, when six lives were lost, to provide Craig with this rare adventure.

Craig has 10 Sydney to Hobarts behind him, never suffers sea-sickness and is dismissive of the towering waves and howling winds of Bass Strait. "It's a matter of knowing when to go into preservation mode," he says.

His interest in big-boat sailing began in the early 1990s when he suffered a shoulder injury playing Rugby for St George. Working as a flight attendant gave Craig the spare time

to indulge his hobby and after Ansett's collapse in 2001 he joined a corporate sailing outfit on Sydney Harbour.

Craig had put together a campaign for the Danish Volvo 60 yacht Nokia when she broke the Sydney to Hobart record in 1999. This and his sailing experience in Australia, the USA and Asia stood him in good stead when he became project manager for world-class sailor Ludde Ingvall in March, 2002. Swedish-born Ingvall had been living in Australia since 1999 and

had teamed up with the company making Nicorette patches in 2001.

Craig persuaded Ingvall to build a new boat after the second Nicorette, built with new carbonfibre technology in Cape Town in 1999, was forced to retire from the 2003 Sydney to Hobart with

keel problems after winning the 2000

The yacht subsequently won the Pittwater to Coffs Harbour event in 2004, however. then lost her mast in the Australia Day Regatta, Not wanting to put a new mast on an old boat, Ingvall adopted Craig's plan to build a new boat. The team started work last July cutting the deck from the original, as if with a can-opener, to fit a new hull. It was a logistical nightmare with 35 men working five - then seven - days a week. The new mast was flown by helicopter from Nowra.



Normally, it would take 12 to 18 months and cost between \$7 million and \$12 million to build a super-maxi. The Ingvall team, although devouring 20,000 man-hours, did it for \$3 million in four months. The customary three months for trials was slashed to just three weeks.

The old Nicorette hull measured 80ft and weighed 4000 kilos; the new model is longer at 90ft but weighs only 1800 kilos. The old craft had a crew of 24; the new, fully-hydraulic, wireless-operated boat requires only 16. "We have a wonderful craft with cutting-edge technology," Craig says. "But the beauty of sailing is that it still comes down to the power of the wind."

Vindication came in last year's dramatic run to Hobart. Five-metre waves and 50 knot winds mercilessly slammed the boat. The other two super-maxis fighting out the lead, Skandia and Konica-Minolta, were among the 56 boats forced to retire. Ingvall won the race when he decided to sail closer to shore in calmer waters nearing Tasman Island.

The final, embarrassing twist came a month later off the Gold Coast when Nicorette lost her mast with 20 corporate clients on board. This was caused by a piece of silicon paper mistakenly left in a crucial join. It had been a miracle the boat made it to Hobart with the mast intact.

Besides promoting a smoke-free world, the Ingvall team is committed to developing the talents of young sailors, regardless of their background or resources, and promoting multi-cultural racing teams. So far 800 young people have sailed with Nicorette team and at least 80 have continued their sailing careers.

Upcoming projects include the Sydney to Southport race in July and an atttempt on the 24-hour mono-hull record off Albany in Western Australia in October. "We would like to see sailing right at the top of the sporting spectrum," says Craig. Australia has the best sailors and the best boat-builders in the world and it has been too long since our last international success in the 1983 America's Cup."

Away from the water, Craig loves the lifestyle he shares in tranquil Bundanoon with his wife Nicole and two-year-old daughter Olivia. Driving to work at Woolwich does not faze him. He encounters his first traffic lights in William Street.



Rebels by name,

Ray Alexander takes a look at the round-ball game.

It was a cool, windy morning at Yerrinbool in October, 2003. The Bundanoon Rebels Under-10s were lining-up to play their first game in Soccer NSW's state-wide Champion of Champions Competition, having earned the right as minor premiers in their Highlands Soccer Association age division.

Their coach, John Kelly, who was accompanying the team was surprised to learn that the opposing club, Cronulla-Sutherland RSL had 146 members in their Under-10s. Bundanoon had 11 players in total, no reserves and were backed up by two recruits from the Under-9s.

Sydney or the bush, you might say! Not

surprisingly, an awesome, well-drilled Cronulla side wrapped up the game 8-1. It could have been demoralising for the Bundanoon boys, but that is not the way sport is taught in this neck of the woods. "Learning how to benefit from a loss is as important as winning," John explained.

Over a cappuccino at The Primula Café, John and Liz Norrie, club secretary, emphasised how critical sport is to Bundanoon. John continued, "It provides the development of our youth through the game... young people learn responsibility, discipline and teamwork and gain confidence, social skills and a sense of community. On the other hand, the parents commit to volunteer time and effort in training, fund-raising and developing facilities."

The Bundanoon Rebels Soccer Club was formed in 1991 as a breakaway from the Exeter club. Simon and Jody Joice were the prime movers of the breakaway, together with Michael O'Neill, Allan Fairbrother, Dean Rowley and his twin-brother, Craig. Dean, a member of the original third-grade side, still

turns out with the All-Aged team and is a life member of the club. Roscoe Jonson, livewire publicist and one of the original players, came up with the club's name. Not only did the third-grade team that year win its competititon, but it also took out the George Auld Cup (a knock-out for third-grade) and the Liberale Cup (second-grade and lower knock-out). An expatriate Scottish family, the Lees, settled in the Highlands and, with their passion for football, soon became entrenched in the Bundanoon Rebels. George Lees even pulled on the boots at age 58 before settling down to coaching duties, while sons Alex and Ray, wife Norah and daughter Evelyn all played for Bundanoon teams.

In 1992, the Rebels fielded sides in first and second grades, making the major semi in firsts and finishing fifth in the seconds. The following year, the Bundanoon ladies entered a team which won the All-Aged grand final against Moss Vale-Bowral. The team comprised Karen Rowley, Debbie Knapman, Kim Rowley, Norah Lees, Evelyn Lees, Vicki Streatfield, Jody Joice, Bernice Lidgard, Kylie Hall, Amanda Scott, Di Hall, Linda Johnson, Karen Jonson, Michelle Lynch, Denise Sedgebeer, Joanna O'Hara and Janine Hayes

The club formed its first junior sides in 1994. Brendan Yalg, who started that year in the Under-7s, is still playing in this season's All-Aged second-division side. The club this year has 106 players, including 21 girls, in nine teams – from the Under-6s to the Men's All-Aged. Their ages range from 4 to 44. Girls are eligible to play from the Under-6s until they turn 16, after which they must play in female competition. Players are mainly from Bundanoon, but include some from Penrose, Wingello and Tallong and one boy, William Peachey, who travels all the way from Bargo.

Last year, when David Brignall was president, Bundanoon Rebels had three teams in grand finals, the Under-11s (who won), the Under-13 and the All-Aged Men. Both the Under-11s and All-Aged were minor premiers. The Under-11s had won their grand final the previous year as Under-10s and were minor premiers

in the Under-9s. In last year's Champion of Champions they went down 2-0 to Pennant Hills-Cherrybrook in the first round.

The club's sponsors are: Primula Café, Bundanoon Country Bakehouse, Dux Hot Water, Haddonstone, Idle a Wile, Pioneer Flask Cellars, Sherwood Machinery Pty Ltd and Complete Photographics. Great assistance with work on the clubhouse has also been provided by Dennis Day, a local builder. Sponsorship and other fund-raising endeavours are vital to the club, as players' registration fees barely cover the levies imposed by Soccer Australia, Soccer NSW (Southern Branch), Soccer NSW Insurances and the Highlands Soccer Association in a heavily-tiered organisational structure. Throw in year'send trophies for every junior player and the club is well behind the eight-ball financially.

Expenses are high, with \$930 outlaid on balls alone this season. Last year's total income was \$21,750 (\$9,300 from registrations) and expenditure amounted to \$17,412. Profits are poured into facilities at the club's Ferndale Reserve ground. John Sant (head coach and past-president) and Suc Sant's caravan provided the only facility until February, 2001, when the first sod was turned for the new clubhouse, part-sponsored by a grant of \$8,000 from the NSW Department of Sport and Recreation. To date, \$32,000 has been spent on the clubhouse.

The canteen, excellently supervised by Michelle Kelly and featuring Bundanoon Country Bakehouse's famous pies, earns in excess of \$3,500 per annum. Other fund-raising efforts include the club's organisation of the Caber Toss at Brigadoon (this vear utilising the caber-cradle designed by John Kelly and manufactured by Dean Rowley from Sherwood Machinery) and the eagerly anticipated Trivia Night (organised by Liz Norrie) at the Bundanoon Club, with a highly soughtafter first prize of dinner for six at Idle-a-Wile.

Twenty-six weeks of training nights and match-day commitments for parents in all manner of bleak weather conditions have its rewards in the smiling faces of fit, exuberant youngsters brought together in healthy outdoor competition. Some will go on to play representative football; others will merely look back on treasured memories and friendships formed on and off the field.

She put her wallet on the roof of her car while she removed her jacket and drove off...!


