


Spotlight on

How well do we know our nearest neighbours?

I have recently returned from a brief stay in Sulawesi. (Where on earth is Sulawesi? You may well ask!)

Previously known as the Dutch Celebes, the Indonesian island of Sulawesi lies just north of Bali and east of Borneo. It is divided into four provinces, south, south-east, central and north Sulawesi. I was travelling with my adopted son, Thanh, who is presently studying for his Master of Asian Studies at the ANU in Canberra and his particular interest in this area was to visit Tana Toraja where very unusual and fascinating funeral ceremonies are held, mostly at this time of the year.

We flew from Sydney to Singapore and then a short flight from there to Makassar, the capital of south Sulawesi. Arriving in the early afternoon was similar to many other countries in south-east. Asia, warm sunshine, waving palm trees and friendly smiling faces. Makassar is a harbour port, bustling with activity and lots of people going about their daily chores. The hotel was situated over the water of the harbour in delightful traditional style houses - beautiful views and wonderful seafood meals. A very pleasant place to relax. However there was no time to relax, we were northward



bound the following morning and after a long drive (although only 300km - how used to expressways we have become!) we arrived in Tana Toraja. Toraja is 'up-country' -mountainous and quite isolated from the coastal towns. One of the most noticeable aspects of the area is the size and grandeur of the local traditional houses - called tongkonans - raised on piles and topped with massive roofs. These houses are closely bound up with Torajan traditions - one of their important functions is as a constant reminder of the authority of the original noble families whose descendants alone have the right to build such houses. They are the meeting places for family gatherings, and may not be bought or sold. Interestingly, Toraja is one of the few places in Indonesia where traditional houses are still being built, and the skills to make them survive. The owners sometimes live in modernstyle houses, keeping the tongkonan for ceremonies and as a symbol of the family's status. The area is predominantly rice growing and the tongkonans, with rice barns, are built in this same traditional style.

The roof, rearing up at either end, is the most striking aspect. Some believe the house represents the head of a buffalo and the rising roof represents the horns, others suggest that the roof looks more like a boat, and the raised ends represent the bow and stern. The houses all face north - possibly because ancestors of the Toraja came from the north by boat and inverted the boats to use as shelters. Others maintain that the north is regarded as the sphere of life, the realm of the gods.

The high gables are supported by poles, and the wall panels are decorated with painted engravings. Each geometrical design has an individual name and meaning. On these panels, red (the colour of blood) symbolises human life; white (the colour of flesh and bone) is the symbol of purity; yellow represents God's blessing and power; and black symbolises death

and darkness. A realistic carving of a buffalo's head decorates the front part of each house. Numerous buffalo horns, indicating the wealth of the family, are attached to the front pole that supports the

The beams and supports are cut so they all neatly slot or are pegged together; no metal nails are used. The older houses have roofs of overlapping pieces of bamboo whilst newer ones are corrugated metal sheets. Standing on thick solid poles, the rectangular body of the house is small in

contrast to the roof, and consists of two or three dark rooms with low doors and small windows

However, it was the funeral ceremonies we were particularly interested in seeing. After setting the scene of where we were and what we were there for I have run out of space



NSW FIRE BRIGADE

Hello Everyone,

The NSW bush fire season has officially started and with such a dry, mild winter its likely to be a high fire alert summer.

Spend some well invested time and check your property and surrounding areas for potential threats of fire. Some areas to be aware of are:

- * overgrown vegetation areas
- * congested guttering with leaf litter
- * bush area in close proximity to buildings
- * storing of flammable and hazardous materials in and nearby building structures
- * a supply of resource water for fire protection
- * fire fighting pumps are maintained and working, pipes and hoses are not damaged or unserviceable, remember plastic poly piping laying on top of the ground will melt in a bush fire situation.
- * what is your escape route and evacuation point
- * remember this is a rural area with sometimes large expanses of area between towns and villages in and around emergency situations the preparation you give to your property could provide the vital few seconds or minutes for emergency services to save and protect your property.

Trees and shrubs around power lines are a major hazard. Check your power lines visually and if in any doubt call your local electricity supplier for advise on your responsibility. Don't try to do it yourself cal in professionals.

BBQ's are a great social and recreational time in summer and remember during fire restrictions stick to the rules of the day. Check your gas bottles and fittings to ensure that they are in safe working order. Check for rusty out of date gas bottles, perished or cracked and leaking hoses and fittings and if they are faulty replace or get them repaired by a certified repairer. Do not become a casualty statistic at your next social event.

From all of the NSW Fire Brigade at Bundanoon we wish you and your families a very merry Christmas and a safe and prosperous New Year. We hope that you don't have to call on us for any emergency but if you do, do not hesitate to call 000.

SCHOOL CHILDREN plant trees for their 21st CENTURY

It had been one of the worst weeks imaginable, with all the horrendous scenes and heart rending stories flooding out of the USA, but on a Friday morning in early spring here in Bundanoon the sun shone as a group of young children from our local primary school planted twenty three trees to mark the centenary of Federation, and for them the beginning of a new century which their generation will largely help to fashion.

Witnessed by a gathering of over fifty adults, mostly members of the Bundanoon community plus a sprinkling of council representatives and the local State MP Peta Seaton, the sixteen children cheerfully went about the task of 'de-potting' and planting the trees (twelve Lombardy Poplars, nine Silver Birches and two Manchurian Pears) in the holes prepared on the site just south of the information bay arboretum. Then, with even grater gusto (and, naturally, with a modicum of adult assistance!) they back filled and raked around each tree in turn. The trees (all fine specimens from Winter Tree Nursery, Canyonleigh) were purchased from the jointly funded Federal Government/Council grant of \$800. A second planting of trees sponsored by individuals from the Bundanoon community will follow in the late autumn of next year (date to be advised)

The gathering on September 14 was officially welcomed on behalf of Council by councillors Duncan Gair and David Wood and BCDA President Mark Corbett spoke briefly in reply, but essentially it was an informal, light hearted occasion with the children happily occupying centre stage. After the event, Council rewarded the kids with liberal servings of soft drink and cakes.

In thanking those who contributed to the success of our initial tree planting project the BCDA would like to mention specifically a number of local business folk who donated their time and services free of charge. Heath Stimson of Southern Highlands Mini Diggers did a marvellous job in digging the holes for us, forty three in all, including twenty smaller holes for the Casuarinas which were planted separately. John Hines of Penrose Country Supplies delivered a load of lovely top soil while Craig Douglas Tree Services of Moss Vale deposited two loads of chip mulch. Our local council gardener Paul D'Angelo also arranged for a load of council mulch to be delivered on site and has offered further assistance as required.

Thanks to all of you who turned up on the day and helped with the planting. In particular we should mention two members of the garden club, Hans Davidshon and Elizabeth Royal who rallied to the cause and worked hard in preparing the site in the days leading up to the event. Hans and Elizabeth also helped plant the Casuarinas while Hans, of course, was one of the star attractions on that Friday morning as he zoomed around on his trusty tractor.

And, finally thanks again to our tree sponsors (35 in all) who responded so generously to our appeal in the August edition of JCG. Your trees will be selected from top class stock at Winter Hill Nursery, Canyonleigh and planted on a date to be advised in May/June of next year. We would like to think that Bundanoon school children might again be involved. JCG will continue to bring you all the details.

Bundanoon 'Hello Girls!'

Part Two

How times changed over the years, with many direct lines available to Sydney, Goulburn and Bowral and the use of the area codes to all places in NSW and all over Australia.

We became secretaries to the Police when they were called out of town, and the Doctor and Fire Brigade Captain if they were going out. They would all usually ring to say where they could be contacted.

If the Town Fire Brigade Captain - Ross Counsell went out for dinner he would ring and say "you can get me at such and such a number please". Ross commented at our farewell, we would ring around until we found him.

We changed from Post Master General to Telcom in the mid 1970s.

One weekend we had very heavy rain with gale force winds, which started on the Thursday and kept up until the start of the next week. It brought down power lines, cutting power to a large area. Our backup batteries had started to run very low. Technicians from Bowral had to bring in a very large generator to assist us, enabling us to connect calls. The generator belted away for three days and nights, but we managed.

There was one Sunday afternoon while working alone, when a call came in. "Quick get me a Doctor! My husband has had a heart attack". But knowing the doctor was out of town (having rung to let us know), I rang through to Matron

Pam Bishop at 'Linkside' who was able to go and assist and had me ring an ambulance, which came from Bowral. Sadly the man passed away, but some weeks later his wife rang to thank me for getting Pam there so quickly. A big thankyou to Pam as she was able to help us out on numerous occasions when asked.

During the 1965 fires, I remember my mother (Mrs Lil Watson)saying, that whilst she was helping with providing food for the fire-fighters, the girls at the exchange were also assisting in many ways. For example, the men fighting the fires had told mum that the shops had run out of cigarettes. A call was made to Jean Greason who was on duty at the exchange. Between then, they were able to arrange for a truck to stop on the Hume Highway out near the Penrose Pine Forest. My father, Doug Watson (the local milkman in those days) along with the local policeman, as traffic was restricted coming into Bundanoon due to the fires, met the truck and picked up a large carton of cigarettes for the men. Dad also made many trips into Dairy Farmers at Moss Vale to pick up fresh milk for the fire fighters to help with their throats (due to smoke inhalation).

23rd May 1979 the Bundanoon exchange went automatic.

The last few weeks were very heetic for us. We had to ring every subscriber and let them know which day we would be changing over and ask if they understood how to make calls for themselves instead of us doing it for them.

Wednesday was a very sad day for us, walking into the exchange room and seeing the 'boards silent', after many years of busy work, and no-one sitting taking the calls.



The then Post Master, Ray Unwin came down and asked us to go upstairs to the front door of the Post Office. Hanging on the door was a floral wreath with a card which read "WE MOURN THE LOSS OF OUR MANUAL EXCHANGE"

The township gave a lovely farewell to the "Hello Girls" on Saturday 26th May and along with a few past telephonists, a great evening, catching up and reminiscing, was had by all.

Many great friends were made and still remain.

NEW COMMUNITY MAPS FOR BUNDANOON

In my work I produce drawings that are used to assist the planning and design of projects requiring architectural input. I am used to interpreting graphical information. In order to understand a problem I need a plan.

Recently at a BCDA meeting a discussion about housing sub-divisions (and one in particular) had me confused. I didn't really know where it was or why speakers thought it was likely to have an adverse effect on Morton National Park due to such things as increased stormwater runoff and its proximity to Glow Worm Glen. Looking around at those attending I could see I wasn't the only one.

In the following week I mentioned this to Danien, a young architect at work and that I thought what was needed was a new map of the village and environs. He felt that it was a good idea and offered to help in the production of such a map.

I approached council who were happy to provide us with digital and hardcopy data to enable us to commence the project. Armed with this, our CADD (computer-aideddesign) software and Photoshop (luckily Danien has welldeveloped skills using this program) we were able to produce a series of maps.

A 'Zoning Map', a 'Potential Residential Expansion Map' and a poster illustrating 'BCDA and Community Projects' (completed or in-progress) were duly presented by Danien at the August meeting of the BCDA with Mayor Phil Yeo in attendance. They are in draft form, although we had them laminated in order to show them in their best light and we are presently adding to them and making corrections.

With the aim of fostering a good working relationship with Council we organised a meeting with Jeff Lawrence (WSC Strategic Planner) a week or two later to show the maps to him for his comments and outline a few of the Bundanoon Community's concerns with regard to zonings. He was able to provide us with copies of the Bundanoon Town Plan (prepared in July 1997) and the Development Control Plan that they are currently using. He was also able to advise us of council's general approach to zoning in the Shire and suggested that we meet for a chat on a regular basis.

Now our names have been put forward by the BCDA to sit on the Bundanoon Town Plan Committee when it is convened in the near future, Both Danien (also a Bundanoon resident) and I hope to provide a conduit by which we can inform the BCDA of any proposed changes to land use within our community boundaries and pass on your ideas and community concerns regarding zoning and planning for our "Village" to council.

So, we started off with a desire to be better informed in just a "graphical" sense and as is often the case, have gone further than we had intended. For the moment we are happy to follow things through.

The maps will be available for reference at most BCDA meetings and also the planning documents provided by Council that we are using to compile them. The maps may be purchased (at cost) for community projects and when in their final form, by businesses at a price to be determined.







Do you remember twenty two primary school children in an FJ Holden? Not a try for a place in the Guinness Book of Records, but the usual squeeze on most mornings when the local taxi collected the kids for school.

Many years ago - or so it seems - children walked to school, later some were lucky enough to own a bike and rode to school, times were different then and children were safe to walk the streets of their home town. Cars were not so common, and certainly two car families were not usual, so if Dad took the car to work, Mum and the children walked.

For those too young to be allowed to ride a bike it was sometimes a long walk, so in the 1960s the local taxi (yes, Bundanoon did have a taxi in those far off days) came to the rescue and organised, with a



Government subsidy, a taxi service to and from school. There was a limit to the service, the need to live at least two miles from school, but if OK the taxi called at the front gate each school morning and loaded another one or two pupils into the Holden, suitcases in the boot, and off they went. Repeat performance in the afternoon, and all was well. I suppose the local policeman (and yes, we did have two full time policemen in the village) must have turned a blind eye, for a time at least, but it was a service much used and much appreciated.



Johann 'John' Schwarzl

Those who knew John Schwarzl, knew him as the 'Bundanoon Baker' with the big family, but there was much, much more to the man who spent the last half of his life in Bundanoon.

The first half of his life was a whole life in itself.

John was born in Graz, Austria. His father had died accidentally before his birth, and he had two older brothers. Later he was older step-brother to another brother and sister. His childhood was poor, and he had to work hard to help his mother. He became a baker after leaving school, in the same bakery that his older brothers trained and worked in.

He served in German U-boats in the later part of WW11 and became a prisoner of war, serving time in Britain and Canada. After the war, he returned to baking in Austria, but also worked as a tram driver, truck driver, farmhand, vineyard worker and dabbled in glassblowing, boxing and motorbike test riding. He lost one of his brothers in the war, and the other passed away shortly after from injuries and illness as a result of the war.

After coming to Australia on the five pound fare scheme, in December 1955, he was sent to the migrant camp at Greta. near Singleton. From there he went to Walcha to assist the baker in the local bakery. Next he moved to Wardell for a job cane cutting, but went back to baking again at Casino, where

he met Betty, they married, and immediately started their family.

The growing family moved along with John and his baking jobs in bakeries at Portland, Kyogle and Lauriton, before they decided to buy their own business in Bundanoon, in 1962. It is from this time that most people know John and his family -Anita and Debra, Christine, Sonia, Mark, David, Andrew and


John was an excellent baker and believed in value for money. He was a very well known baker as well, and his sales to customers in Sydney and down the coast rivalled those locally. He was a generous, friendly, and very social man but, unfortunately, a baker's timetable didn't allow for too much socialising. This was generally limited to the Friday night visit to the local watering hole, as many hard working men did, (often returning late in the evening with the meat raffle tray he had won after, we suspected, buying a whole book of tickets!) but from time to time he would 'shut the shop' for a day on the weekend to take the family down the coast for a day of swimming and fishing.

After retiring at the age of 68, in 1993, John's life slowed down somewhat, although he was not one to sit still for too long. In 1994, he decided to drive solo across the Nullarbor to visit Andrew, who was in Kalgoorlie at the time, and the two travelled further west for some sightseeing. Then, more trips followed to various places in NSW, and a trip to New Zealand to visit Anita.

> John's grandchildren brought him immense joy in his retirement. Eight grandsons and one grand-daughter at the time of his death. He has instilled in his children, the importance of hard work, fairness, tolerance and generosity, and has passed on his intelligence and love of music. His untimely death was brought on prematurely by a serious accident he suffered in April last

John Schwarzl was certainly one of life's characters, and although by no means perfect, he touched the lives of the many people who encountered him over the 38 years he worked and lived in Bundanoon. You couldn't help but like him, and his passing signals the end of an era,

He rests in peace.

Born 18-2-1908 at Dulwich Hill Died 10-7-2001 at Picton

Maud, who preferred to be called Mid, grew up in Dulwich Hill during an era when families made their own fun and entertainment. Brother Harry played mandolin, Mid and Amy played piano. Other brothers George and Bill were the comic actors in the group. Holidays were spent camping at Avalon when that area was still bush. One holiday the piano was loaded onto the truck and went camping too! They were all keen on boats, sailing or rowing. Mid's dream of joining a rowing club was squashed as being 'unladylike' especially after arriving home from a date with a split down the back of her dress caused when she insisted on doing the rowing!! But horse riding was acceptable, and riding weekends at Picton were the go. She loved the theatre, musicals especially.

Mid worked as a secretary in a big shoe factory in Sydney prior to her marriage. She met Jack Mangold at Bundanoon while holidaying with her family at Hillside Farm, a working dairy farm stay. Mid and Jack were married on the 31st August, 1931 at Dulwich Hill, and lived in a cottage on the dairy farm at Bundanoon for the next ten years.

During that time Mid experienced great joy and great sadness. Joan, the first born died after only four days. Betty was born in 1934 followed by Helen in 1938 and June in 1940. But Betty too died, aged six in 1941. This was a disruptive time for Mid and the next six years were spent following Jack's work on building sites to Braidwood, Lithgow, Katoomba and Wetheral Park. In 1946, while at Wetheral Park, Peter, the long awaited son was born. Towards the end of 1947 the family returned to Bundanoon. The house on the corner of William Street and Railway Avenue was built. Then in 1950 Jacky was born.

Mid worked part-time at the Primula Cafe with her sister-in-law Diney and her sister Joey. The gem scones are still talked about! She was a tireless worker for Red Cross for many years, and card evenings at 73 Railway Avenue were serious affairs.

When the children left home, Mid was able to indulge her adventurous spirit and travel. She attended June's wedding to Joe in Canada and was able to visit that family five times. With friends Heather and Les Smith, or Lil Tooth and Emm Rundle, she visited and remembered many places throughout Australia.

She was an avid reader of travel books, especially on Africa, biographics and historical novels. Jean Hines, in Mid's latter years kept her supplied with bags of books. Mid had a keen mind, and a good memory, and kept abreast of the news. She was very proud of the local Jordans Crossing Gazette and enjoyed reading it from cover to cover. She wrote numerous letters stating her point of view on a wide variety of subjects. We have Mid to thank that ladies can now buy sockets that are sized, not 'one size fits all'.

During her latter years she enjoyed the weekly meetings of the Bundanoon Group where she and her friends would play 500, no matter what was on the program. Mid was very proud of her children's and grandchildren's accomplishments and thoroughly enjoyed the great conversations the younger generation.

Then on Tuesday 10th July she peacefully passed away.

Bundanoon District Pre School Celebrates 20 Years!

Recently Bundanoon District Pre School celebrated twenty years of community pre- school education with the opening of a new environmental area and family 'picnic' evening.

The word community has never been more apt than in its connection to our pre school. On September 18, 1981 the pre school commenced after discussions held to address the lack of sufficient pre school facilities in the area. With nineteen enrolments and Geraldine Hood as director the pre school started in the RSL Hall in Erith Street. This was a temporary measure and the need for a permanent site needed to be addressed.

The committee of the time lobbied hard and held discussions with the Department of Youth and Community Services. Wingecarribee Shire Council, ministers and local councillors to ultimately gain a grant from Wingecarribee Shire Council. This grant combined with money from fund raising and pledges from local businesses and tradesmen finally saw the existing building up and running.

It all seems easy when you read about the time and effort involved in establishing this service, but it took until September 1983 (which is a lot of Saturday morning working bees) to officially open the pre school in Burgess Street.

The essence of this community spirit has been sustained and encouraged by the current director Helen Waterhouse. Helen, who has been at the pre school for five years, has been ably assisted by a group of committed parents and community members over the past three years to develop, within the pre school, an environmental area incorporating both exotic and native plants, vegetable and fruit gardens, to encourage the children to participate in producing their own food.

But the vision doesn't stop there, Helen has plans to include an indigenous food area, where children can sample some 'bush tucker', a sculpture area, where works of art can be displayed as an ongoing project. The aim is to promote an understanding and appreciation of the arts/nature/indigenous culture. Of course the children also have their own project on the drawing board. A pole sculpture with an indigenous theme is to be displayed near their own vegetable garden.

When you walk over the pre school grounds the improvements seem to have taken place overnight, but Helen assures me that it has been very much a team effort over a long period of time to achieve the wonderful results which are evident as soon as you walk in. From the fantastic wall mural with its nature theme to the well mulched, well tended strawberry patch this is certainly a pre school which offers our children a tremendous start to their learning years.

Congratulations must go to Helen, the staff and the current committee for their commitment to the pre school. Also to the past staff and parents that worked so hard to establish this quality service in our town.





Of general interest is our popular, annual Christmas street stall on Saturday 8 December, a stall full of goodies on sale.





International Year of Volunteers - well done! Also congratulations to those other Bundanoon residents for their awards.

Spring is upon us - a most delightful season in the Highlands - gardens abound with blossoms, bulbs and wisteria.




Haddonstone also donated all the expensive garden pots that have been raffled/ auctioned and helped our fund raising to achieve our goal.


