Sponsor a Tree

and Help Colour Our Autumn Landscape!

Priday, September 14 is a date to remember. It will be tree planting day in Bundanoon. And we, the Bundanoon community, have been invited to take part. You can make a personal contribution by donating or sponsoring a tree (or, perhaps cosponsoring a tree with a friend or neighbour). But first, a few facts and figures.

Hundreds of trees are being planted in towns and villages throughout the Wingecarribee Shire to mark this centenary year of Federation. Council is contributing \$40,000 to match a Federal Government grant of equal proportions. Of this amount Bundanoon has been allotted \$800 hardly a princely sum, but the BCDA is adopting a positive attitude towards the project and is appealing to members of the community to lend their support in helping to make this a really worthwhile addition to Bundanoon's autumn landscape.

The suggestion that we concentrate mainly on deciduous autumn colouring varieties came from the Garden Club, and the BCDA warmly welcomes the club's involvement in the project. A committee consisting of representatives of both groups has been formed to make recommendations as to planting sites, tree varieties etc.

The major site will be at the northern approaches to the village (sorry, town!) just south of the Information Bay Arboretum. The area was planted in somewhat haphazard fashion with a variety of mostly native shrubs under the Skillshare Scheme in 1995/96. Some of the better ones. including two non-weeping willows and a Yunan Poplar, are probably worth preserving but eventually the area will be dominated with Liquidambars, Nyssas, Pistacias, Poplars, Bradford (Manchurian) Pears, Silver Birch etc - all noted for their autumn leaf colouring.

To provide a permanent dark green backdrop a line of Casuarinas (Cunninghamiana var.) will be planted along the railway land boundary at the rear of the site.

The second proposed site is located at the junction of Penrose Road and Ross Street on a triangular strip of council owned land bordering the old Bellevue Park guest house. Here we are proposing to plant six or seven Liquidambars.

In addition to the Casuarinas (tube stock), the joint committee has recommended the purchase of approximately 55 trees (the bulk of them being (continued Page 3)

semi-advanced deciduous varieties) at an estimated cost of around \$1500. Allowing for Council's contribution of \$800 that will leave a shortfall of \$700. Add to that any extra costs for ground preparation, hole digging, tree guards, fertilisers etc and the final figure is likely to be closer to \$1000 - which the BCDA is prepared to guarantee, relying on funds raised at last year's Garden Ramble. However, the Association would welcome any additional assistance the community might be prepared to offer in the way of sponsorships. \$30 will enable an individual or a family to sponsor a tree. Simply complete and detach the form below and post with your cheque to The Treasurer, BCDA P.O. Box 12, Bundanoon 2578 or come along to our next general meeting on Thursday August 16th at 7.30pm in the Memorial Hall and pay in person.

In the event that applications for sponsorship exceed the number of trees available, the BCDA will need to decide (after consultation with the Garden Club) whether to proceed on a 'first in' basis or conduct a ballot. As an alternative to refunding unlucky applicants, we might consider extending our planting programme to include other areas or invite intending sponsors to contribute to a tree maintenance fund.

The names of all sponsors and donors will be recorded and displayed in a suitably prominent location yet to be decided. The resultant trees when fully grown and resplendent in their autumn tonings will earn the lasting admiration and gratitude (and maybe a toe wiggle or two of delight!) from those who follow in our footsteps in the century ahead.

"Right," said Fred

(with the Angels - Part 2)

"How about another of those yarns about your great grandfather, Ark Angel?" I asked. "Right," said Fred. He thought for a moment. "Well", he said "there was this one about a ghost "

It happened, he told me, round 1920. Old Ark was returning home on horse back fairly late one evening from the Three Legs o'Man Inn. The pub, now demolished, used to stand alongside a bridge over the Medway rivulet near Berrima. The reconstructed Three Legs o'Man bridge is still marked today where the creek runs under the Hume Highway approaching the Berrima turn-off. When Ark reached Bogs Crossing on Golden Vale Road (the early bullock drivers used to call it Bogs Hollow) he saw (or claimed he saw!) a ghost rising out of the mist in front of him. According to Ark, the horse reared and he was thrown onto the side of the

road. When he 'came to' the horse had bolted and was subsequently found three days later in Belanglo Forest. Ark swore he had seen a ghost but others who knew him well weren't so sure, and behind barely concealed smiles reckoned he'd probably had one too many that night at the Three Legs o'Man.

Ark, or Harkless as he was christened. had a brother Daniel and a sister Emma Augusta. They were the three children of Emma and Walter Angel, the convict whose murder was featured in our May edition. So Daniel Angel would have been our Fred's great, great uncle. Nothing much was known about Daniel's side of the family by the Bundanoon Angels until (and you'll find this hard to believe !) a copy of the same May edition of JCG was handed

to newcomers to the village, John and Jeanette Shaw who have recently purchased a property at the end of Victoria Street. John was reading the magazine one morning in their lounge room when he suddenly called out to his wife who was in the kitchen, "Drop everything and get yourself in here. Look what I've found!"Jeanette came in and he showed her the article on the Angels. "Good heavens," she said, pointing to Ark's old photograph, "that's my great, great uncle." Her mother's maiden name was Angel and Daniel, Ark's brother, was her great grandfather. She had been trying to trace Ark's side of the family for years and now she had landed up right in the middle of them here in Bundanoon! Small world.

Fred was telling me about his early childhood. He was born in Nowra when his dad was cutting sleepers down on the

south coast. Over the years, he told me, the Angels often left Bundanoon to find work in other parts of country NSW but, like homing pigeons, they would eventually return to settle here. His Dad was no exception and when Fred was two the family moved back to Bundanoon and lived in a cottage just across Paddy's River off Ferndale Road. They were there in 1939 when the 'big fire' came through - bigger than the 1983 fire, says Fred, and, without doubt, the worst in living memory (Lucy Rocca, Ross Counsell, Isabel Greason, Audrey Petersen, et al would remember it vividly). The Angel's cottage was one of the many casualties burnt to the ground. Before the fire, Fred and his brothers and sisters had been saving their pennies in an old Commonwealth Bank money box. When they went back to rake over the smouldering ruins they found the old box, now molten by the heat, with the pennies all fused together. For a while the

> kids used to chip them off and (unbeknown to mum!) use them to buy sweets, but, in the end, the lady in the shop where the Good Yarn now is wouldn't take them any more. They became a bit unrecognisable as pennies, said Fred, after all that cold chiselling!

> Fred was just seven when his father

died and for a while the family fell on hard times. One local shopkeeper in particular used to take pity on them and keep them supplied with broken biscuits to take home. They attended Bundanoon Public School and Fred, like many a youngster down through the ages, was no innocent when it came to a spot of skylarking before and after school.


Daniel Angel There was this older lad they called 'Stringy' - a bit of a scallywag from all accounts. He and Fred and one or two others often took a short cut through what was then vacant land between the present Primula and

the Chinese Restaurant. The latter. then a cafe and mixed business known as The Paragon, was run by an old biddy who each morning was in the habit of tossing out the contents of her slop bucket from an upstairs window onto the vacant ground below. The boys

to teach him, no doubt, not to be cheeky in future!

Then there's the delightful story of how Fred and Irene met after she had swished past him on her bike one morning in Hill Street. Fred was feeling a bit crook at the time having just survived a rather nasty operation and was walking gingerly up the hill towards the doctor's surgery when Irene flashed past. One glance was enough, though, for Fred. As soon as he became more mobile he set off to track her down and, of course, we all know the happy ending to that story.

For every tale of Fred's we've managed to squeeze in here there are plenty more left to tell. You could say they are there rather like good ale on tap, waiting to be drawn-yours for the asking, in fact. Right, Fred?

So Long, Wayne Tildsley

On an early Sunday in July, Camp Orana was bursting at its seams. Locals were packed in, to say farewell to Rev. Wayne Tildsley and his family, who have relocated to Richmond Anglican Church. Earlier the Bundanoon Anglican Church had spilled out as folk gathered to hear Wayne preach his last sermon here.

Most had mixed feelings, fond memories of Wayne reaching out to people struck by tragedy, and sadness at saying good-bye. After lunch Wayne was thanked by many for his readiness to help: at the scene of Wingello's fire tragedy; at the homes of people suffering loss through suicide; and the countless hours counselling school boys from Sydney after their classmate fell to an untimely death.

Most residents know that Wayne used to be a policeman before training for full time Christian ministry. I was curious why the change? In fact, it was a logical development. Wayne said they are very similar. Both encourage people to see the benefits of keeping the law. Only now he wants people to remember God's best Laws, and the Son God sent to help us live by them. But he didn't need to leave the police, did he? "It's a matter of reaching as many as possible with God's love," says Wayne.

What will he remember most about Bundanoon and the southern villages? Definitely the vast friendships with many in this community - "and the depth and genuineness of these friendships," he said, "and I'll never forget the way I witnessed God reaching out through His people, to help others whose hearts were broken by tragedy. To see God's love shown, and received, in practical ways, as together people set about rebuilding their lives...it is an amazing thing."

And out of Bundanoon's annus horribilis? "Out of a very public and traumatic time for Bundanoon grew the awareness of needing each other. Remember that community meeting, when the national press swarmed into the memorial hall? The locals, having run the gauntlet of the press, were determined to support their neighbours who'd suffered so much loss. The community has strengthened; people value each other."

A final word to the men and boys of this town: "Believe in yourself - have confidence in you. And do things with mates....a DIY project, a sport. It's important to do things with mates."

Wayne was our minister for just six and a half years, but he left his mark. The Youth Centre was established by Wayne as was Carols on the Oval. Even the 'Mid life Crisis' men's basketball team, "we played A-reserve in the Moss Vale comp and won three trophies!"

Thanks, Wayne. We'll remember you. A man's man.

t may not be common knowledge but on most mornings of the year, come rain or shine, summer through winter, a group of regulars including several in their sixties and seventies and at least one self confessed eighty year old (no names, no pack drill) jump in and do their laps at Solar Springs pool.

Mind you, once you get in, the water may not be quite as cold as the ocean at Bondi in winter (the 25m indoor pool is heated, of course) but even so, at a time of day when some of us may still be curled up underneath the blankets, the resilience of these hardy souls is certainly to be admired.

The Streets Where We Live

o we ever wonder about the street in which we live? I don't mean the pot holes, or the uncut grass but how it got its name. Was it called for a long time resident or some far away place?

Some street names are obvious - Church Street with two churches Old Wingello Road, the early road to Wingello and other places which joined up with the Old South Road . Railway Ave, please not Parade or Street, but always Avenue, Penrose Road the way to Penrose, although some years ago there was an aberration, some residents wanted it called Kareela Road, but this was very confusing, as there is a Kareela Road in Penrose, and somehow Penrose Road was so familiar that it soon reverted to that name. Panorama Ave and Viewland Street are self explanatory, but what about Ellsmore Road. Erith Street, Ben Nevis Circuit, Rosenthal Ave and William and Phillip Streets?

In the 1880s if you wanted to leave town to go north you travelled along Sutton Forest Road. Later on, with other roads opening up and the Exeter road finally completed in the early 1900s, Sutton Forest Road became Old Sutton Forest Road, and later still changed to Ellsmore Road. The Ellsmores were very early settlers in this part of the town and the late H.T.Ellsmore (Barry's father) was Shire President for many years.

Erith Street is another street which just grew as houses were built and land opened up. When the railway arrived in 1868 it cut Walter Grice's land in two, so he had land fronting what later became Railway Ave, and a large area on

the western side of the line. This land he divided into roughly 25-acre blocks and gave one to each of his daughters. The early Erith Street was a very short street, from Old Sutton Forest Road to about the end of the bicycle track in front of Killarney. As each 25-acre lot was built on the road was extended, finally reaching the railway bridge at the northern end of town in about 1934. From Old Sutton Forest Road south, the hotel was about in the middle of the present street, so when the new (present) hotel was built and the old one pulled down, the road was extended to the railway bridge. Erith is a small town on the river Thames in the U.K. from where the Bakers came.

The coal mine was re-opened by them in 1881 and also called Erith.

Ben Nevis Circuit is on land called 'Ben Nevis' and owned by early Bundanoon resident N.C.deMeyrick ,who was our first Estate Agent.

Phillip and William Streets are named for early pioneers of the town, and really should have an 's' at the end of their names, the families being Phillips and Williams.

The area encompassing Ross, Ella, Florence and Willis Streets was a Nicholas sub-division in the 1880s, and these names appear in the Nicholas family even today, so it is reasonable to assume that they were named for members of the Nicholas family.

Rosenthal Avenue commemorates Lt.Col.Charles Rosenthal (WW1) whose family lived here for a short time. His father was a fettler who went on to train as a teacher and became resident teacher at Belanglo.

Some street names are lost in time, streets such as Nerrim, Barnett, Birriga, so maybe any sleuths out there might like to research these names. The History Group would be most grateful.

This is just a taste of the origins of some of our street names. Maybe some other time we might add to this list.

Do You Remember

When?

Do you remember when the ice man came. A hessian bag over his head and shoulders to keep him dry, although

usually rather damp by the end of the day.

The ice chest was in the kitchen and the tray underneath which caught the drips from the melting ice had to be emptied every day. The new block of ice

was put in place in the top of the chest, ready to keep butter, milk and meat fresh and cool and maybe

even set a jelly.

As a help to the ice chest the housewife may have had a 'cooler' cupboard - a shallow cupboard set into the cavity of the wall with gauze at top and bottom to allow cool air to circulate - this was before houses were set on a concrete slab. Another adjunct to the ice chest was a drip safe, or a Coolgardie safe, kept on the back verandah so any chance breeze would blow through the wet hessian and keep the contents of the safe cool. A wise precaution was to set the legs of the safe in tins of water to keep the contents safe from ants. If none of these aids was available and there was a spring or well nearby then the items to be cooled were lowered in a bucket into the cool water. Is it any wonder that jelly was a rare treat on a hot summer's day?

The ice works were run in conjunction with Greason's butcher shop. The 'old' butchers shop in Erith Street had a louvred 'tower' at the back of the shop, with water running down the louvres when ice was being made.

When electricity came to Bundanoon in 1929 from Port Kembla, it was the beginning of the end for the ice man, as refrigerators were soon on the 'must have' list for many households.

Bundanoon 'Hello Girls!'

Part One

Being a Telephonist at the Bundanoon Telephone Exchange Memories of Lyn Clarke

bout 1957 I first started as a telephonist at the Old Post Office, Post Master General (PMG) which is now the Post Office Cafe in Railway Avenue.

The exchange was situated at the rear of the Post Office and many times we had to ask the customers to quieten down to be able to hear the caller. Due to the high ceiling and also, in those days, the Morse Code tapping away either with incoming or outgoing telegrams, it would get quite noisy.

The Post Master then was a Mr Morris who, with his family, lived upstairs. The exchange was later moved upstairs into the front room, due to the increased phone numbers. Mr Morris and his family moved to the Post Master's house in Penrose Road (next door to Idle A Wile). During this time I worked with Pat English, Anne Whyte (nee English) of the Whytes of Moss Vale, Eileen Crisp (Kellond) and another lady whose name I cannot recall.

I left in the late 1950s to marry. Married women in those days were unable to hold a permanent position. This was changed in the late 1960s.

As Bundanoon was then known widely as a holiday town, there were many guest houses, and at holiday times we were kept quite busy at night from 6.00pm, when many visitors would want to 'ring home'. At Rosnel, a Mrs Williams who worked in the office, along with Norm and Mary Edmanson, would



wait and collect quite a few callers together before ringing us to say she had, say, six or more calls. We were then able to tell her how long the waiting time was for a line out. With the other guest houses also ringing in, there was sometimes a wait of up to two to three hours. This was due mainly to the exchange only having one direct line to Sydney, and when possible we would ask Moss Vale or Bowral if they could help; many times they did. These were known as 'through calls'.

Sometimes if a caller wanted to ring, for example Temora, we would have to go through from three to five exchanges to be connected. If you happened to close the key, one of those exchanges would 'pull the plug' and of course the process would start all over again.

When visitors wanted to use the public phone to ring long distance, they would come to the window to book the call and pay. They were amazed at what and how things went on to connect their calls.

There were also what we called 'party lines' connecting two or three homes on the one line, each home having a different number of rings.

Penrose, Wingello, Tallong, Exeter and Sutton Forest each had a small exchange which were only open in office hours. These closed for lunch and would be manned by the Post Master at night from 6.00pm to 9.00pm, after which they were closed until morning. If an emergency occurred during the night the Post Master would be woken by what we called the 'Night Bell' to take the incoming or outgoing call.

The new Post Office and Telephone Exchange in Church Street was opened in March, 1958.

There was a lovely big exchange room at the back of the Post Office, along with a change room and kitchen upstairs. It was at this time I returned as a part time telephonist in 1968, relieving the full timers during their holidays and sick leave.

In August 1973, head office in Goulburn approved another full time telephonist, giving the exchange four full time staff.

Beryl Eirth (now Reid) was on duty when the Head Supervisor rang to ask if she knew of any girl that could start full time. "Lyn Clarke" she replied! I had been playing competition tennis, so Beryl accepted the position for me.

I worked alongside Jean Greason (nee Kellond), Beryl Eirth and Nell Halls, and really enjoyed the work. The night staff were Roger Bell, John Simcox and Tony Vollebregt. In later years the night shifts were shared by Jenny Sarginson, Lyn Gibson and Virginia Mair who, along with Lyn Gibson, filled in for holidays.

In later years there were Aileen Parry, Joy Connors, Eileen Manning, Robyn Manning and Joan Berrick.

The Post Master when I returned was Mr Berrick who was then replaced by Ray Unwin.

The night staff would initially take over from us at 11.00pm and work through to 7.00am, this then changed to 10.00pm through to 8.00am. They slept on a folding bed alongside the exchange board and when a call came in it would ring a bell and if the night staff were sound asleep a bigger one would sound. Some nights the staff would be lucky and not have a call after 11.00pm until 6.00am, when things got started for a new day.



Cowley and Bernie Waldon, who feature very well in the video taken on the day.


We have some interesting events coming up. In August Jim Merson will conduct a rose pruning session. There will also be a fruit tree grafting



Friends of Morton National Park

In May last year, we reported in JCG on our success in obtaining a capital assistance grant from NSW Department of Sport and Recreation towards the upgrading of the access road and track to Fairy Bower, in Morton National Park. Stage 1 of this undertaking has now been completed and the top section of the track has been transformed with a lengthy flight of well graded steps. The continuation of this work in Stage 2 will begin (hopefully) quite soon.

The amenities block at Gambell's Rest has also been up-graded by National Parks and Wildlife Service; the building has been painted throughout, the floors tiled and the area surrounding the building sealed. It is now very much more user friendly.

Our organisation focuses on two distinct areas: keeping the walking tracks in the park clear of obstructions by holding twice monthly working bees and raising funds which are utilised in improvements in the park's facilities. For example, in 1994 we contributed just under \$10,000 towards the erection of a viewing platform in Glow Worm Glen.

designed to give access to the area without it being trampled by visitors.

Given this commitment to the protection of Glow Worm Glen, we are concerned about the impact that the recently approved 44 lot residential subdivision known as the Glow Worm Glen Estate, bordering on the Council section of the Glow Worm Glen walking track, will have on the existing natural drainage and vegetation of the area. The subdivision includes excavation and development works within forty metres of numerous unnamed watercourses which discharge onto the neighbouring property "Springhill" and thence into Dimmocks Creek and Morton National Park. It is vital that this water remains unpolluted and that its flow is not disrupted or altered in any way by the construction of roads or dwellings up stream, for the survival of the rainforest (especially the coachwoods) in Glow Worm Glen.

There is also the problem of noxious and environmental weed invasion. This will undoubtedly intensify in the Glow Worm Glen/Dimmocks Creek catchment as a result of the increase that will occur in the number of dwellings in the 44 lot subdivision. Run off from the new subdivision will be enriched with nutrients and will proliferate along drainage lines into the National Park

Glow Worm Glen is an environmentally sensitive area and a well known tourist attraction - as is the National Park. For this reason alone it is surprising that Council has not required a statement of environmental effects from the developer. It is even more surprising that, as far as we know, the development application was not at the outset advertised in the press, thus precluding our organisation, National Parks and Wildlife service and others likely to be affected, from commenting on it.

We contend that Bundanoon owes much of its identity and reputation to the National Park and Glow Worm Glen in particular. That the new subdivision has been named 'Glow Worm Glen Estate' seems to be capitalising on this but, ironically, the biodiversity of Glow Worm Glen could ultimately be threatened to the point of extinction when the subdivision is engineered.

Glow Worm Glen Track Committee

The work on the Glow Worm Glen Track is progressing well and we were very fortunate to have the services of Sarah and Belinda, the Bush Regenerators from Council, for three days in June. They tackled the blackberries on the track, just above the wetland and have uncovered some steps from the old path. Who knows what might be revealed in the future? Does anyone know how long the glow-worms in Glow Worm Glen have been an attraction in Bundanoon?

More of the blackberries have been cleared from the old rock wall but the cape ivy is proving very persistent. Some native trees have been planted along either side of the wall and on the flat grassy area and most of them are thriving.

It is very pleasing to see the maidenhair fern regenerating along the track at the two creek crossings. When we started our working bees in 1998, we concentrated on this area first and it is now relatively weed-free. We are hoping to tackle the blackberries in the wetlands next, and prevent them from overpowering the native grasses that thrive in these conditions.

The group is rather concerned that the new subdivision of 44 lots, The Glow Worm Glen Estate, may have an

adverse effect on the glow-worms and the Morton National Park. We have written to Wingecarribee Shire Council expressing our feelings, especially with regard to the stormwater run off, some of which would appear to be flowing into Dimmocks Creek, above Glow Worm Glen. We are awaiting confirmation that this will not occur, as glow-worms are very sensitive to pollution and require absolutely clean water to survive. The pollutants, which are of particular concern to us, are detergents and oil (from car washing), nutrients and weeds (from gardens) and domestic pet waste etc, being washed down the stormwater drains. If the amount and quality of stormwater entering the natural watercourses is changed, it could upset the delicate balance of the environment in Dimmocks Creek and Morton National Park. Glow Worm Glen is one of the icons of Bundanoon and many people from various locations, on hearing of Bundanoon, immediately associate it with the glow-worms.

We welcome anyone who would like to join us on our working bees on the second Sunday of each month. We meet at the top of the track in William Street at 9.00am and finish by noon.

Glow Worm Glen Estate

Velajaby, the developer of the parcel of land referred to in the report from the "Friends of Morton National Park" has noted several areas which could be of concern to the residents of Bundanoon. There is absolutely no question as to the importance to Bundanoon of the National Park and Glow Worm Glen both to tourists and locals alike. It is most important that the integrity and eco-environment of the Glow Worm track be maintained both now and for future generations.

The abovementioned report appears to have preceded a meeting which was held some three weeks ago between ourselves, senior Council staff, a representative of Parks and Wildlife and three members of the 'Friends of Morton National Park'. At that meeting these same issues were addressed and discussed in detail. Velajaby has subsequently had constructive correspondence with the members of this group.

The issues that were addressed at the meeting are summarised as follows:

- The council officers explained the application process under the current legislation, and noted that the land has been zoned for residential purposes for at least twenty years. It was noted that the block is zoned for 700 sq m home sites and if these were applied for many more blocks could have been attained on the site.
- The Council, the project designers and Velajaby staff explained that the development is to be wholly contained on site and that special engineering precautions have been designed to

ensure that the water run will not exceed the pre-existing situation. These plans have been approved and considered by both the Council Engineers and the Department of Land and Water Conservation. Every precaution has been taken to ensure that the rate of discharge will not be increased above pre-development conditions.

Velajaby management suggested and it was agreed that Velajaby plant native trees along the section of the property which adjoins the Glow Worm Glen Track and asked the 'friends' present if they would recommend trees and assist in the planting. The representative from National Parks and Wildlife offered to provide a list of suitable trees. This has been provided recently. This activity will soon be undertaken.

The management and staff of Velajaby would like all readers to note that the company is very aware of the proximity of the development to the National Park and because of this it has not tried to maximise the development of the site. Furthermore, it will assist the 'Friends of Morton National Park' to achieve their goals. And, please note the name 'Glow Worm Glen Estate' was used previously, not by us, but for the Garland Road development so to imply anything further in the name would be misguided.

We are sure that since this will be a tasteful and environmentally sensitive development, the new residents of the estate will be just as proud of their National Park heritage as the existing members of this community already are.

What is this BUNDANOON QUILT all about?

In April 2001 an application was made to the Wingecarribee Community grants scheme. Our objectives are to create a quilt/wall hanging of exceptional standard to reflect local history and indigenous issues within the local community using a professional needle and textile artist, Jennifer Corkish. Wingecarribee Shire Council notified us on the 27th June of our success on obtaining the grant for stage one.

Our idea was to bring the clubs, schools, churches, indigenous and service groups of our town, Bundanoon, together for a common cause. This will provide a worthy pictorial work of art for all to take pride in which will be kept on display in the community hall and will be available to the local groups for special functions. This work of art will be owned by the community of Bundanoon, not by Wingecarribee Council or any one organisation.

This will involve gathering local history of Bundanoon from the people past and living in the town. Indigenous history will be gathered from the Gundagurra people and the National Parks and Wildlife rangers.

This will help the young and old appreciate and take an interest in their local community.

The quilt/wall hanging will be three metres wide and two metres long made from layers of fabric, hand appliqued (stitched). For the non sewers, the easiest way of describing the quilt is like a large painting only instead of using paint, fabric is used.

Points of interest in our history have been the guest houses, coal mining, logging, the hotel, Brigadoon, Morton National Park and the gullies and we are looking for more suggestions. We need old photos, drawings, books and maps so that Jennifer can draw a picture of our town. If you have old photos or drawings that you don't wish to part with, we could take a photocopy.

The project is expected to take two to three years to complete, as there is much research, drawing and pattern making involved in stage one before the sewing can begin.

Jennifer has been giving talks to many of the local community groups within Bundanoon and the response has been overwhelming. If your group would like a visit from Jennifer and the committee to discuss the project and how you can get involved please contact us. Otherwise you will be able to see the progress of the plans and sketches on display at the Garden Ramble in October.

THE CRAFT OF WOODTURNING

t is apparent that woodturning was invented some 3000 years ago in the Middle East and the methods changed little over the next two millennia. However in the 15th century innovations occurred which enabled turning to be more conveniently performed, and the principle whereby a revolving headstock turns the material for shaping has remained unchanged in the modern lathe.

Until recent times most woodturning would have been performed by professionals or dedicated craftsmen, but the increase in the 20th century of individual wealth and leisure contributed to a spectacular growth in hobby turning from about the 1970s.

In 1983 the Sydney Woodturners Guild was founded by teachers, students and ex-students of the woodturning course at Sydney Technical College.

The Guild is a craft/hobby club, mainly composed of amateur turners, and is open to anyone without age, race, sex or skill discrimination. There are also professional turners on the membership lists, though the Guild

generally con-

sists of

people

are interested in learning from and assisting others

who

in the craft of hand woodturning.

The motto of the Guild is "by hand and eye" which reinforces the philosophy of turning with hand held tools with a minimum of mechanised aids.

The Guild operates through regions, some eleven at the moment, ranging from Blue Mountains City in the west, Hornsby in the north and Southern Highlands in the south, as well as others throughout the Sydney suburban area.

The Southern Highlands region slowly came into being from late 1994 when occasional meetings of a few enthusiasts were held in the odd garage/workshop bringing together ten or so members. However in 1995 the first more formal meetings took place with Peter Herbert of Colo Vale being the convenor, and the current convenor, John Page of Bowral took over early in 1997. Peter Herbert went on to become the President of the Guild, a position he has now held for some two years.

In the 1995/96 period the local region began to meet regularly, first every two months then monthly, in a

large workshop owned by Don
Akrigg of Moss Vale, and the
local membership is now in excess
of 70.

Meetings usually take the form of a guest presenter demonstrating a particular facet of turning, or an associated aspect, such as finishing. There is usually a "show and tell" session where members are encouraged to bring in articles turned to a preconceived form, eg. a goblet, a candlestick, a whistle and these are constructively critiqued by the guest presenter or any visiting or local professional. Members are encouraged to use the lathes at the meetings, particularly if they are experiencing any difficulties, so that assistance may be provided by any more experienced turners.

The Regional Committee has for some time been looking for premises which would allow the group more flexibility for more frequent use of the facilities, and was recently fortunate enough to discover Charlton Hall in the grounds of and owned by Harbisoncare. This building was no longer in regular use and in fact plans were afoot to remove it.

Following successful negotiations the local Woodturners now have a permanent home which will not only enable their members to have more frequent access, but will also provide a woodturning facility for the residents of Harbisoncare.

At this stage the Woodturners will have their regular meetings on the 4th Saturday of the month commencing at 12.30 and anyone requiring any further information could contact John Page on 4861 4201, John Rossiter on 4884 4409, or Albert Hodgson on 4883 9542. As a further matter of interest the Southern Highland Woodturners will be presenting "The Woodshow" in conjunction with the Berrima District Volunteer Rescue Squad at the Berrima District Pony Club grounds on Saturday 8th September 2001, with net proceeds being shared between the two organisations.



Scouting in Bundanoon 1923-1980

Scouts and Cubs first met in Bundanoon in 1932 and were first registered on 9th February, 1933. Meetings were held in Tylers Hall each Thursday at 7.30pm. The first troop's scout leader was William (Bill) Neaves. The first cub leader (Akala) was Ella Lynd Tyler who owned the Bundanoon (Royal) Hotel.

Tylers Hall was situated near where the Hotel swimming pool now stands. The group started with 18 scouts and 12 cubs. The foundation President of the first group was Mr Joe Counsell. Late in 1933 the group held a carnival near Tylers Hall to raise funds to buy land and build a scout hall. We were honoured by a visit by the then State Governor Sir Phillip Game, who opened the carnival. Enough money was raised to buy a block of land in Nicholas Gully opposite the Church of England rectory. Lack of leaders forced the group to disband and the land was lost to the group. The next attempt to reform the group occurred when it was re-registered on 6th July 1936. Meetings were held in the supper room of the new Memorial Hall on Monday nights. The scout master then was Mr Albert Reading who was the local blacksmith. His assistant was Mr Eric Endercott.

Country Women's ASSOCIATION

March 1927 - July 2001. Yes, Bundanoon branch is over seventy three years old.

Bundanoon branch began in March 1927 and was opened by the then State President Mrs Studdy. The first meetings were held in private homes. In 1939 land was purchased for one hundred and fifty pounds. A further 245 pounds was needed to cover the cost of building our rooms. A member loaned this money to be repaid at one pound per month. Members held street stalls, coffee mornings, raffles and rented the rooms to pay off this loan.

A Baby Health Centre was established in 1946 and remained until 1961 when it was transferred to Moss Vale.

Members continue to enjoy participating in handicrafts, cookery and international culture. Our country of study for this year is Thailand. Our International Day was Monday 23rd July and a well-attended function. Our medical research which is supported state wide goes this year to Retinitis Pigmentosa.

We support non-government funded research.

Came the war years and again lack of leaders forced the troop to disband. An attempt was made to reform on 18th July 1940. They met in the supper room with the assistance of the Rev R.A.Johnson as scout leader. After the war the troop met in a large shed at the back of the then newsagency. In the late 60s a scout hall was built with volunteer labour. The scout leader was then Bill O'Keefe who lived in Ebury Street. Over the years the scouts and cubs went on numerous camps. The earliest one I remember was to Tudor House. Other leaders who assisted over the next few years included Syd and Edna Rogers, Mal Counsell, David Whally, B.Harpley, Peter Carter, Vera Tournabene, Les Fuller, Les Johnson. The group has gone on until today with some energetic leaders.

Turning out the cupboards in the Club House a week or two back a photograph album from the early 1990s was discovered.

This will mean that we are not so dependent on the vagaries of the Highland weather and our young people will be able to ride safely even when the ground is wet under hoof.

Better facilities mean we will be able to host more pony club events and increase our membership. More members mean more fun and some of the best fun is to be had at our annual jamboree. This is where all the clubs in our zone, which spreads from Wingello to Wollondilly, get together for two days of riding classes, showjumping, and novelty events. We either rough it under canvas or sleep in the back of a horse float on the Friday and Saturday night, and spend the weekend competing. Now, whilst pony club is all about having fun, it is for many people about winning, which is fair enough, but brings to mind a sobering story....


At a jamboree some years ago a new 'junior handler' class had been introduced. It was a huge class of more than forty young riders, the temperature was approaching the 30s and the judge was being particularly thorough. After at least an hour and twenty minutes one mother

was heard urging the judge to 'get on with it'. At which point another mother of a very talented and successful junior rider replied that the judge was one of the best in NSW, had probably forgotten more about showing than most of the assembled mass would ever learn, was doing a great job and we should stop whinging. It is fair to say at this point her child was standing in first place and looking like winning the class. After another gruelling 30 minutes the judge drew breath, summoned the ring steward and awarded the ribbons. Instead of starting at the top of the line with the blue she started at the bottom of the line, relegating one of the State's most promising riders to sixth place. There was a difficult to discern noise, something between extreme dissatisfaction and rage from the child's mother, who rushed off to see about that' whilst the rest of us suppressed wicked giggles.

Pony club is fun and some of the best times have been when finally the ponies and children are in bed (not in the same place), the events of the day can be mulled over with a similarly exhausted pony club parent and a glass of red wine.

So, if there are other like-minded people with pony mad kids of either gender - because we do have keen boy riders - (who do also manage to play soccer), then come and join us. Bring a sense of humour, you'll need it.






