The Voice Referendum



Information Evening Thursday 22 June 6:00pm for 6:30pm Bundanoon Soldiers' Memorial Hall

The Bundanoon Community Association has long recognised and acknowledged the land of Bundanoon as part of Gundungurra Country. Our meetings and many events in the Hall begin with heartfelt acknowledgement.

While there is almost universal support for Indigenous recognition in the Constitution, concerns remain about the actual wording and possible ramifications arising from the proposed wording.

We are holding an information evening on the upcoming referendum. At the time of this flyer, the wording of the referendum has been drafted as:

"A proposed law: To alter the Constitution to recognise the First Peoples of Australia by establishing an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice. Do you approve this proposed alteration?"

We have well-known local Huw Kingston speaking on his upcoming walk of some 3,000 kilometres from Uluru to Parliament House in Canberra. He plans to arrive at Parliament House in Canberra on the day of the referendum, the end of a journey he has called Take Heart.

We also have Professor of Law at ANU, Professor Asmi Wood. Professor Wood is a member of the Referendum Engagement Group and the Constitutional Expert Group. As such, he is truly an expert able to provide a briefing and answer questions on the wording of the referendum. As a member of the Groups, Professor Wood will not be speaking for the 'No' case or the 'Yes' case.

We may have other speakers. The evening will moderated, with each speaker providing a briefing and then, through the moderator, questions can be asked.

We hope members and visitors can attend what will be an informative evening. No bookings are required. Light refreshments will be served at the conclusion.

With a Bundanoon-based Connector, we're getting Community Circles Wingecarribee underway.

New in town? Feeling left out and disconnected? Or looking to build a supportive local network?

Find endless possibilities for making meaningful connections through Community Circles Wingecarribee. Check the daily Facebook feed for circles near you, from catching up for a few laughs, pub-singing, or finding solace at a Death Café.

As Connector, Rose keeps in touch with what people in the community need and turns what's missing into something with meaning and purpose they can be part of. The idea can be simple, and the circle can be small. It's the inclusivity that counts. "Whatever we do, we make sure it's accessible for everyone to join in," Rose says. One of her first shout-outs was for anyone keen for a few laughs, singing at the pub. "200 people said 'I'm in', so now we'll keep that group going with a local songwriter and musician." Locals from all walks of life have been eager to do their part to help connect their community. From retired professionals to mental health support workers, Council workers and stay-athome mums, the initiative involves various volunteers.

"Once they've undertaken Community Circles training, their involvement is so valuable," Rose says. "We have a lawyer wanting to volunteer advice, a local Dad is co-facilitating a Disability Supported social group, and at the Death Café gathering, a grief counsellor can advise on dealing with grief through art. People appreciate the opportunity to connect over a cuppa and talk openly about preparing for dying or dealing with loss and how to get on with the rest of their lives in a safe, supportive space."

WSC is the first Council to have backed the Community Circles pilot within its LGA, with an investment of \$20,000. This amount has been matched by the Touched by Olivia charity, dedicated to bridging the gaps and breaking down barriers to connection in our communities. "We've been working very closely with our villages and share in the priority they place on creating ways to strengthen community circles," says WSC Community **Development Coordinator** Corinne Buxton. "Together with the NSW State Government and Touched By Olivia team, we want to help local communities build capacity for staying connected in inclusive ways through this simple initiative."

Organisations such as Creative Space, Meals on Wheels, Pop-In, Wingecarribee Aboriginal Community Centre, and Highlands Community Centre are also involved.

Packed with activities run by locals for locals, the Community Circles Wingecarribee Facebook page also posts practical free services such as men's health checks, stress and trauma clinics, and more.

Whatever connecting looks like for you, Community Circles Wingecarribee can open the door. Find out what's on near you by regularly checking in with Community Circles Wingecarribee on Facebook.

Buy a sausage sanger at this year's Bundanoon Winterfest on Saturday, July 1 and you will be helping to save the lives of children with cancer.

Bundanoon Lions has joined this year's Lions Biggest BBQ which is targeted to raise another \$250,000 for theAustralian Lions Childhood Cancer Research Foundation (ALCCRF). Proceeds from the Lions' BBQ at Winterfest will go to the Foundation.

So far the Foundation has raised \$12 million in just seven years for 16 major research projects including brain tumour immunotherapy at Monash University, enhancement of brain immune cells at the University of Western Australia and nanotechnology to treat neuroblastoma, the most common solid tumour in young children, at Macquarie University.. More than 450 Australian Lions clubs will hold barbecues during the year to raise funds for medical research into the causes and prevention of, and to find a cure for, childhood cancer.

"It never ceases to amaze me what Aussies can do when they work together," says ALCCRF trustee Peter Lamb. "Who would have thought the good old Aussie barbie could have been used to help Lions raise over \$12 million for childhood cancer research. Well that's what we have done but the job's not over. More than 900 Australian kids are diagnosed every year with various forms of childhood cancer and unfortunately we are still seeing around three kids dying every week. We believe every child deserves the chance at a healthy life."

Young Ava Bell is just one success story thanks to the efforts of scientists and Lions. At 12 months of age Ava was diagnosed with a 5.5 centimetre neuroblastoma in her chest and abdomen and the cancer had spread to her bones. The Lions' Foundation funded the first Phase 2 clinical trial of two novel drugs (Interferon and Valproate) in kids suffering from neuroblastoma. The trial involved Children's Hospitals in Australia and New Zealand. The goal is to make it part of the standard treatment for children diagnosed with neuroblastoma around the world.

This year Ava started High school.

We are one of the largest and most active garden clubs in Australia.

Our monthly meetings are social events with keynote speakers who are experts in their field. At the meetings, we offer a lending library full of gardening books, current gardening magazines, and DVDs for our members to borrow. Our "Trade Table" is where you can pick up locally propagated plants for a fraction of the cost you'd see at nurseries or markets. Grown by club members, you'll know that they'll work. The meetings are highly entertaining and very social.

The club also presents a series of monthly open gardens called "Friendship Gardens". These are often local gardens, but sometimes we venture further afield to visit private gardens that are opened exclusively to our club members and their friends, mostly free of charge.

We also organise exclusive day trips to famous public gardens. Some of these are part of the National Trust's portfolio, others are extensive private gardens and acreages.

Since 2022 we have once again been able to offer gardening workshops. These are so popular that we are building up a calendar of workshops, including "How to shape mature trees", "Propagation Techniques", "Growing Heritage Roses" and many more. One of our new workshops will focus on teaching new residents how to get the best out of Bundanoon's soil and climate. We know that for many people moving to this area, their choice of plants and shrubs can fail due to a lack of local knowledge.

Our free monthly newsletter is packed with stories and articles that are both entertaining and educational. We have local contributors and edited texts from a broad range of professional nurserymen and journalists.

Many people may not know, Bundanoon Garden Club looks after the Garden of Memories (Uniting Church), The Southern Villages A.N.Z.A.C. Memorial Garden, and Nancy Kingsbury Memorial Park.

The club holds seasonal dinners that are very popular and our catered Christmas Parties are well organised and well attended.

The Café is open for business again, offering coffee/tea, homemade cakes, toasties etc on a Friday, 10am to 1pm.





SOUTHERN HIGHLANDS CARRIAGE CLUB INC has

so far planted over 120 Native & Exotic species of trees and shrubs around its facility in Quarry Road, Bundanoon, with a Queen's Jubilee Tree Planting Grant.

The Commemorative Opening Ceremony was performed by Angus Taylor MP on February 4, 2023, with other Council and Community representatives invited to attend.

This coincided with an Event that SHCC was conducting that weekend, so many Carriage Driving competitors and their friends contributed their enthusiasm and support.

SHCC is also building a large driving competition obstacle, to honour both the late Queen Elizabeth and Prince Phillip, it will be named "Balmoral Castle" and will be enjoyed by many and be a reminder of their passion for and dedication to the wonderful sport of carriage driving, and other equine sports.

SHCC also successfully obtained funding from the Stronger Country Communities Grant for an outdoor multi-discipline dressage arena surface, which is now in the process of being built. This is a much-needed public training/ competition tool and will be available to many ridden disciplines of equine sport, as well as the driven discipline in the Southern Highlands area and beyond, and is the only facility of this





kind in NSW other than AELEC in Tamworth and SIEC in Sydney, both of which are totally out of the financial reach of not-for-profit sporting clubs.

This is very exciting for SHCC, as it continually strives to improve and upgrade the facility which is used and enjoyed by SHCC and Moss Vale Pony Club, as well as other equine bodies.

Many local community groups and organisations, of all types, together with many visitors, use the camping facilities provided by the Club when local festivals such as Brigadoon, Winterfest and Garden Ramble etc. are taking place.


Motorhome/caravan groups also use the facility for their Chapter Meetings and other celebrations, or just for their monthly club weekends away.

SHCC has just learned that it has been chosen as the WINNER of the U.K. Carriage Driving Awards for 2022, after coming second behind France in 2021, in the category of Best International Carriage Driving Club/Society!

This is a huge honour for SHCC, as some years ago it made a firm commitment to provide as much expert training for all Australian Carriage Driving Society members, and Equestrian Australia members, as possible. The club has been super proactive in bringing Bram Chardon from the Netherlands, twice yearly for ten days at a time, to Bundanoon, prior to Covid of course, but this program will be recommenced in early 2024, when all the worldwide problems have hopefully eased.



Bram competes in both the indoor and outdoor European competitions with his four-in-hand teams of Dutch Warmbloods and Andalusians, and is neck and neck with Australia's own Boyd Exell, originally from Bega, and now based in the Netherlands.

Both Bram and Boyd alternate as the World Champion in this huge sport in Europe, so it is wonderful that SHCC brings such world class training opportunities to Bundanoon, for the benefit of so many drivers from across Australia.

Then of course there is is SHCC's National Training Program, with Mr. Phil Marshall coming from Victoria every second month for six days of coaching, with participants coming from across NSW.

And to top everything off, SHCC has been invited by the U.K. Carriage Driving Society, to participate with them in the "Zilco Ashes", which is the inaugural International short format championships at home, from August 8 – 12 2023.

This competition has been designed for the grassroots drivers to participate initially in the championships, and then to gain a place on the Australian Zilco Ashes Team headed up by none other than Australia's own World Champion, Boyd Exell, as Honorary Australian Team Captain.

The Championship Festival will be conducted at SHCC's grounds in Bundanoon, with four days of specific Training offered to participants, prior to the two competition days. Both Championship Competition days will be fully televised by H & C CC TV, with interactive commentary taking place throughout.

Competitors will be coming from interstate to take part in the first ever event of this kind, and which will next year, by all accounts, become a truly global event.

This has never happened in the Australian carriage driving world, so it will be an enormous promotion of driving in this country, as well as putting little old Bundanoon on the worldwide map.

Everyone is invited to come along and show support for Bundanoon, Southern Highlands Carriage Club, the Zilco Ashes Australian Team, and enjoy the excitement and buzz that this event will deliver.

The Ghost of Mary... and others

Modern Australia is a largely secular country so it's a bit surprising that there are believed to be so many haunted places in Australia and no end of people interested in such stories. Our marvellous media from time to time have stories reflecting this interest e.g. "The 12 most haunted places in Australia", whilst travel companies obligingly offer tours to, for example, "Australia's most haunted places" or enjoining one to "Discover the country's nine spookiest locations."

Not to be outdone Bundanoon has its own resident ghosts who 'live' in the Bundanoon Hotel. Most interest centres on 'Mary' who, grief stricken after losing her son, took a room at the hotel sometime in the 1930s, swallowed some pills (poison?) and set fire to her room. It is unsure in which room this occurred – rooms 36 and 39 have been proposed but room 38 is most favoured; indeed, there are burn marks on the dining room ceiling directly below that room. Both hotel staff and guests continue to feel her presence (e.g. cold chills, a 'sense' of someone being present even when they are alone) to this day, both in the rooms and the hallways.

Lest all the limelight fall on Mary, people have also experienced two other ghosts assumed to be from the time the Commercial Hotel occupied this site (1884-1892). The first is an old welldressed gentleman and the second is an elderly lady who sits in the dining room either sewing or knitting. These two always seem to have a benign presence.

Should there be any doubt about the existence of these apparitions, several investigations have been conducted at the hotel by people skilled in the art of investigating the paranormal. For instance, one such person used motion

sensors, dowsing rods, tarot cards and other devices to confirm Mary's presence. The sensors were constantly being activated by Mary, and the dowsing rods allowed direct communication with her. They sensed from Mary an overwhelming feeling of unresolved grief (which explains her ongoing presence at the hotel), and some need for resolution, though there is nothing evil in her intent.

Other investigators have similarly sensed Mary. Indeed some have photographed and filmed unexplained shadows and spectres as well as using other techniques to confirm the presence of the supernatural in the hotel.

Now, of course, whether one is a believer or not in any of this is a moot point. Suffice it to say that it is difficult to confirm whether Mary actually existed or that she set fire to and died in her room. Any such events would have attracted the immediate interest of the police. There would have certainly been a coronial inquest to determine the circumstances of Mary's death, as well as the fire. It is also safe to assume that newspapers would have reported this event and any subsequent inquiry. The trouble is there is no evidence of these events in any newspapers, the NSW Government Gazettes of the time, or any other readily accessible contemporary source.

So, is the story of Mary true or not? Future research may confirm these stories, indeed may even confirm Mary's ongoing presence. But for now, you can always have a glass of 'Mary Ghosts Red Ale' at the hotel, and maybe give a toast or two to Mary and her supernatural companions!

A MYSTERY TO MANY OF US

What will kill you in the garden, or at least make you very ill?

I've occasionally been asked, in my previous life as a nursery woman to advise on plants for school gardens. It is crucial to know what is unsafe to plant, but, if you read the books or Google poisonous plants, you could become unnecessarily agitated. Still, some knowledge of common poisonous plants is good especially if you have young ones, who are likely to put everything in their mouths.

I like adding flowers to food, sometimes as decoration, other times for flavour. And this is becoming more common with the sale of punnets of flowers for garnish. Some that I use safely are herb flowers like sage, chives and rosemary. Others are big bold nasturtium flowers with their peppery flavour, violets and heartsease, clove pinks, calendula and borage. But some people, and children, if they follow you around the garden, think that means every flower is for edible.





Foxglove (Digitalis purpurea) flowers are truly beautiful and attract children with their thimble like flowers to fit on tiny fingers. But please don't let them eat them. Whilst there are not many cases recorded of poisoning in Australia, their leaves have at times been mistaken for comfrey. Symptoms include nausea, headache, skin irritation and diarrhoea.

Another common garden plant to be aware of, and this one edible, is **rhubarb**. Stems make a wonderful dessert and chutney, but the leaves are poisonous to eat, as they contain toxic amounts of oxalic acid. (It's OK to touch them). Symptoms may include mild gastrointestinal symptoms, and more serious problems such as kidney stones and kidney failure if you ate a huge amount.



Beautiful **oleander**, seen more often in Sydney, but growing in the Southern Highlands can be lethal in all its parts. Just touching the plant and tree sap with bare hands or inhaling the smoke of burning oleander can induce toxic effects. All parts of the plant are poisonous when eaten, even if the leaves are dry of the shrub is dead.

And it's not just people who will be poisoned, we've heard of goats dying after a meal of oleander.

Aconite is a poisonous plant that you are less likely to have in your garden, but if you love blue, and rare perennials, then you might. Or you may have inherited it. Known as monkshood, it has an attractive shape like a monk's cowl in a deep blue. Other names hint at its danger – wolfsbane, leopard's bane and devil's helmet. It is used in homeopathy. All parts, especially the roots contain toxins, the most dangerous is aconitine, both a heart and nerve poison. It has been used since ancient times as a poison on spears and arrows, and ancient Romans used it as a method of execution. Symptoms include numbness, slow or fast heart rate, respiratory paralysis, nausea. Can be deadly.

Hemlock is dangerous as it resembles a big parsley. It has big umbels of white flowers like so many in the Umbelliferae family. Some hemlock plants are distinguished by purple blotching near the base of the stems. There used to be plants growing wild near Moss Vale shops, and in an Open Garden we visited years ago in Bowral. Hopefully plants were destroyed after we pointed them out! This is the plant that Socrates was forced to drink in 399BCE after being found guilty of impiety by a jury of Athenians. He didn't survive!

To finish off, and I could go on, fly Agaric,

Amanita muscaria are gorgeous looking, but lethal, toadstools, red with white spots, like something out of a witch's fairy tale. Amanitas occur in our paddock, and quite possibly in yours at this time of year, under pine trees after autumn rain. It is important to distinguish them from the edible slippery jacks and delicious pine mushrooms (saffron milk caps) also growing there. Luckily they are very distinctive.

Scurrilous deeds and S.C.A.N.D.A.L

THE CHIMNEYS OF Ferndale stand alone! Their stance is mighty yet sullen against a backdrop of the natural world! They hold the account of a page in Bundanoon's history when, on a night 75 years ago, fire completely destroyed the elegant rooms they warmed. They hold answers to a burning question – was this a blameless calamity or were scurrilous deeds and scandal perpetrated?

The chimneys are nestled in a meadow on an Old Argyle Road property. They stand in ruins, united yet solitary; withholding the knowledge of what caused the fire at the luxury guesthouse on the night of 19 January 1937.

Long gone are imported marble mantles and elaborately carved fireplaces. Long gone are the proudest chimney pots in the district and the latest fashionable house accessories of 1896 when the house was built as a grand private residence for wealthy Sydney businessman John James Booth. Long gone are classical ornaments of silver and displays of painted ostrich eggs – all lost in the glowing embers and ashes on that fatal, foggy night.


But as the cinders cooled, suspicions and whispers grew loud. How did this fire start? How could the clouds of smoking evidence be unseen for so long? Why was the fire not reported until the next day? Who was watching as the spark ignited and then resolutely took hold? Did someone act alone, or was there an accomplice? Who and what could be gained by razing Ferndale?

A Bowral auction notice of November 1936 (a year earlier) describes Ferndale as a farm–guesthouse with outstanding appeal, The house is of two storeys, strongly built of weatherboard. The notice also described 12 bedrooms graciously appointed with cedar panelling, quality oak furniture and featuring soft-furnishings of sumptuous satins and embossed fabrics. Two bathrooms, 4 lavatories, lounges and dining room, plus modern conveniences of septic system, telephone and wired for electric light. Ample water supply. Tennis court and swimming pool.

It was indeed a splendid respite for those who could afford to flee the humidity of the city but at the time of the fire the accommodation was virtually closed and the property was on the market.

Mr Frank Knight, who had an oil importation business, owned the guesthouse but his fortune of late was diminishing. Sinking from lavish moneyed heydays into mounting debt, he was on a business trip to America when the fire occurred. Mrs Gladys Sandford had been employed as manageress of Ferndale, although she lived in separate rented accommodation, and at the inquiry she admitted that at Knight's request she had been at Ferndale searching for a plan of the house in a storeroom at 3 pm on the afternoon of the fire. She had not brought a light, so she used safety matches to light the dark. The storeroom was packed with odd items including a bag of kapok. She said that all was well when she left soon afterwards.

Townsfolk had always regarded her with suspicion as she was from Sydney and was the first woman in the district to have a driver's licence. In fact Gladys, originally from New Zealand, was the first woman aviatrix in that country and according to an article written by Michael Throssel for Highlife (December 2000/January 2001) she often drove to Goulburn to fly at the fledgling Aero Club. She was also reputed to be Frank Knight's mistress and had a financial interest in Ferndale.

Little is known about the caretaker Anthony Regan, a farm labourer who was employed by Gladys in 1936. He gave evidence at the inquest that he lit the kitchen fire in the morning and that it was not alight before he left the property in the afternoon. He did not return until 7.50pm when he found the smouldering ruins glowing ominously in the mist. All was gone!

He informed Gladys who told the inquiry that she didn't report the fire until the next day because it was a wet night and she didn't have transport. In the opinion of Constable Rudge, the local police officer, although the nearest phone was two miles away, neighbours who could have assisted her lived only half a mile from her house.

Constable Rudge had enough suspicion about the fire to report it to the Sydney Arson Squad and although they conducted an inspection of the property, curiously, they were not called to give evidence. The police investigation and the coroner's inquiry of 19 February 1937 estimated that the fire had started around 3.30pm on 19 January and was not reported to police until the next morning on the 20th January.

Knight owed Gladys £403.00. It was known he was also in debt to many local businesses in Bundanoon and Penrose. The Ferndale insurance policies were current, lodged with Queensland Insurance Company for the sum of £2250.00 for the building and £600.00 for contents. An inspector said the portfolio was not over insured. When Gladys was asked about the contents during the inquiry she stated that furniture had not been removed or sold. Significantly though, no drawer handles, glass and crockery fragments or metal objects were

found in the ruins although I have retrieved one blackened teaspoon from the site.

After a day-long inquest the magistrate could not find enough evidence to say how the fire started – whether it was calculated or simply an unfortunate accident.

So why did salacious rumours persist of Ferndale's furniture, antiques and artefacts being sold through dealers in Sydney? And how is it that I now possess the heavy, royal blue drapes from the dining room given to me by a local man who told me his late mother bought them from Gladys Sandford after the fire?

Indeed a mystery!

JEWISH APPLE CAKE

This recipe comes from the Israeli Embassy

This Jewish apple cake recipe is thought to have originated in Poland. It is often made for Rosh Hashanah (the celebration of God's creation of the world).

PREP

- Pre-heat oven to 180C
- Grease and flour a bundt pan

INGREDIENTS

- 4 large Granny Smith apples, peeled, cored and finely sliced
 - 3 tsps cinnamon
 - 5tbs sugar

In separate bowl, mix together the apple slices, cinnamon and sugar. Leave to soak while making cake batter.

Drain liquid in bottom of bowl - don't add to cake batter

BATTER

- 3 cups plain flour
- 3tsp baking powder
 - ½ tsp salt
- 2 ½ cups caster sugar
- 1 cup vegetable oil
- 2 ½ tsps. vanilla essence
- 4 large eggs (lightly beaten)
- 1/2 cup freshly squeezed orange juice
 - Icing sugar for dusting

METHOD

Sieve/sift flour, baking powder and salt into a large bowl Stir in sugar, oil vanilla essence, eggs and orange juice Pour half the batter into prepared tin

Cover with half the apples

- Pour on remaining batter
- Arrange remaining apple slices on top

Cover top with foil

BAKE for 70 – 90 minutes.

Cake is cooked when a skewer inserted comes out clean. Cool in tin, remove carefully. Serve dusted with icing sugar

One autumn morning I was driven by members of the Bundanoon Community Garden on a somewhat mystery journey to the nearby village of Tallong. It was a glorious day and the sun shone warmly. Arriving at our destination I was greeted at the property by more members and Bud, the seven year old son of Bel and Magnus the property owners. With a welcoming smile on his face Bud offered me the treasure hidden in his hand. It was a very welcoming gift, a cape gooseberry. I love cape gooseberries and this one was freshly picked and warmed by the sun and the embrace of his hand.

Over the last few years the members of the Bundanoon Community Garden have been on an adventure gardening first in Bundanoon then Exeter, then Tallong. Meanwhile their current temporary home in Tallong is producing amazingly abundant crops. Amazingly because of the variety of produce that I thought could have been devoured by birds and animals and with none left for the workers. I was there when the last of the pumpkins and tomatoes were harvested and the remaining parts of the plants now stripped of their fruits were thrown on the compost heap or tossed to the goats. The day of my visit many hands, both young and old helped with the work of picking, storing and preparing the beds for the next planting which will be a garlic crop the group's main source of income.

The tightly knit group share their love of gardening, hard work and the companionship that shared experiences provide. Results from the efforts involved include the pleasure of eating meals made using the produce that they have grown and harvested. After a few hours work everyone stopped to eat. There was a huge cauldron of homemade soup and crusty bread to celebrate their achievements. Chattering and laughter peppered the conversations that were mainly centred on future gardening plans.

Eventually the group started to disperse and go home. People were laden with produce. Each person or couple took with them a box of tomatoes, big tomatoes, and little tomatoes, red, yellow and green tomatoes. I was told that the members would cook and bottle them, and then bring them back to the group and share at the next meeting.

This hard working group have worked and travelled well over the years, they have survived many travails including drought, bushfires, floods and homelessness. Now they are a cohesive and harmonious group that is looking forward to gardening in their new home which is once again based in Bundanoon. The plan is to start planting there in the spring after preparing the necessary hardscape and landscape. You will find them along Ellsmore road, behind the pre-school. Bundanoon village will welcome them back and celebrate the beginning of this new and exciting time for community gardening in Bundanoon.






