President's report

Carl Sagan is one of my heroes. He was an astrophysicist and science broadcaster, famous for the TV series Cosmos that exposed the wonders of the universe and evolution in easy-to-understand language.

To me, his greatest achievement and gift to humanity is a photograph of the earth as a tiny dot in an otherwise empty space. Known as the Pale Blue Dot it is the furthest "selfie" of us.

It was his request for NASA to turn the tiny Voyager spacecraft to face Earth and take a photo from six billion kilometres away.

The picture is stunning in showing our planet, alone in empty space, but more striking are the words that Sagan wrote as a poetic homage to earth. His quote is a plea for unity and for kindness. To remind us when viewed from this distance there are no kings and peasants, no righteous or evil, no heroes nor cowards. We are, in his words, "on a mote of dust suspended in a sunbeam."

I still maintain Christmas is a time to believe in miracles. The miracle I would like to see, selfishly for me, is to lose the dividing reaction of "us and them", and to only see the "us" in everyone. This hard-won ability is truly the miracle of our existence. From a selfish gene, we have paradoxically evolved the capacity for feeling outside of ourselves. It is the centrepiece of the journey of the Pale Blue Dot. I hope your altruistic wishes come true...

Council is sharing the Christmas spirit far and wide across Wingecarribee this year!




And with this Christmas expected to be a hot one..... Bundanoon Pool will be a welcome retreat.

Snakes and Bundanoon life

When I worked at Council, every Spring guaranteed we would receive at least one call from a distressed new resident, with the urgency of a 000 call, that they had just seen a snake in a park or their backyard and Council need to do something about it "NOW!"

The caller was astounded that the snake response team would not slide down their poles, with sirens blazing a-la-Ghostbusters, be there in five minutes to remove this 'dire threat' to country living.

After explaining that Council would not respond, some callers were accepting and others indignant that Council would do nothing. That we all need to accept that snakes are a part of our Southern Highlands ecosystem. In modern language, residents need to adapt to their presence.

So too in Bundanoon, where we share our beautiful environment with the shy, slithering serpents. The snake most likely to be seen is the appropriately named Highlands Copperhead (Austrelaps ramsayi). When seen at the right angle and light, its skin is a glorious glowing copper. Living in a peri-urban area, we also will see the Eastern Brown Snake (Pseudonaja textilis), a species that have adapted perfectly to our fields, and supply of rodents. Red Bellied Black Snakes (Pseudechis porphyriacus) are also to be observed near our waterways.

There is a creek crossing on the Jordans Crossing Reserve that has resident Highland Copperheads. Walking on the path, with dogs on lead, keep an eye out and you may be lucky enough to see one. Provided it is not threatened or concerned, it is as likely to attack as a Blue Tongue Lizard.

Ray McGibbon, from Southern Highlands Snake Catchers has simple advice "Here's the good advice – a snake you see is generally moving through, so don't try to catch or kill it. Contact me though if a snake seems to have taken up residence at your residence".

It is worth investing in (and carrying) a compression bandage, the very effective emergency treatment for suspected snake bites. Wrap the bandage tightly – as per a strain – from the limb extremity to the top of the limb. Stay still and seek urgent medical assistance.

Rather than "beware" of snakes, "be aware" when walking, gardening, and moving items around the yard. The goal is never to surprise a snake and for them to always have an escape route. There are videos of (very confident) people allowing brown snakes to move through their legs, even when sitting down – not recommended - however demonstrating that unless threatened, snakes do not attack.

Best observed at a distance, snakes are a part of our ecosystem and pose no threat unless they are cornered. Like crossing the road, it is a matter of keeping your eyes open and moving at the speed of your surrounds.





Reaching Out

A new playgroup for Exeter

Since inception just over 100 years ago the CWA's core purpose has been to undertake initiatives to improve opportunities and facilities for rural women, their families and their communities.

In rural settings neighbours are often not close by, extended family members may be far away, and tightly-stretched community services simply don't have enough outreach programmes to compensate for the difficulties in accessing the sort of social support that taken for granted in suburban or city living.

Therefore, after becoming aware of how difficult it was proving for many young rural families - especially families new to the area - to meet others and form connections with the community, Exeter Branch took action and has had the pleasure in helping establish a new playgroup for children 0-6 years of age.

Our role has been to facilitate the birth of this playgroup and bring young parents and bubs together so that they can develop friendships, create networks and feel part of a community.

The inaugural morning was a wonderful success and the group meets weekly in a lovely old barn at The Farm Club, Werai, by courtesy of business owners Alice and Hugh Clarke.

The Group runs every Friday from 9.30 – 11.30am offering free play opportunities and some music and movement activities. We supply morning tea for the parents, and have sourced donations of toys, and we enable the logistics of setting up and packing away each week.

The Group is off to a great start and will become fully parent-run and self-sufficient by Christmas.

With competitors coming from most States, plus a driver from N.Z., the Zilco Ashes was a huge success and was televised live worldwide, promoting carriage driving to the wider community, another first for carriage driving in Australia, and SHCC is so proud of its achievements in this regard. Many lovely comments came from across the world about our beautiful gum trees, and the noise of wild birds singing, so Bundanoon and Australia were the flavour of the month. The support of many Bundanoon community volunteers was much appreciated, so mark 9th and 10th August 2024 in your calendars, as next time around the competition will involve many European countries, U.S.A. and N.Z.

To top off a wonderful year, SHCC has just learned that the Club has been granted an annual licence on the Crown Land 25-acre block directly opposite SHCC grounds. The Club had a trial run of this extra land. including it in in our marathon course for a recently held event. It worked very well and was thoroughly enjoyed by the drivers. This extra land will allow the Club to conduct bigger and better events in the future. Now there is much hard work ahead for members to help in making good this whole area for equine use, benefiting so many for years to come.

As part of the marathon course, we were able to use a portion of Bundanoon Quarry, providing a very scenic and almost prehistoric route, with drivers enjoying the different scenery and the challenge that it provided for them and their horses. A huge thank you to Troy Stratti, owner of the Quarry, and Brendan Matthews, for organising this experience for the Club.

During 2023 the National Trust invited SHCC to showcase carriage driving at "Golden Vale" in Exeter,

and "Riversdale" in Goulburn. An invitation to revisit "Golden Vale" in May 2024 has been accepted, with the Sydney Regency Group coming to conduct their workshops, and no doubt to be taken on more carriage rides, a real highlight of this year's visit.

SHCC already has a full calendar of Clinics, Championships, Events and Club Training/Social activities planned for 2024, making for another busy and hopefully exciting and progressive year.

The new Outdoor Multi-Discipline Dressage Arena surface is nearing completion and will be a game changer for competitions, training, and many other activities, resulting in an increase in competitor/visitor numbers coming to Bundanoon. SHCC is the only Carriage Driving Club in Australia to have an arena surface of this type, which will benefit both the ridden and driven disciplines of equine sport, not only for local equine enthusiasts, but for those from further afield.

Bundanoon Public School



Our normal...

As we, the Year 6 of Bundanoon Public School 2023, begin our transition to a high school environment, we have reflected on our natural environment. We all live with the impact of bushfire, drought, floods, pandemic & uncertainty. We have found that currently the natural environment is in the worst state in recorded history - what is normal for us is the worst ever.

In 2009 (before we were born) our community set a benchmark in environmental protection with the Bundanoon on Tap campaign. We invited the original members of the campaign to speak to us and learnt that this was a world first initiative to get rid of singleuse plastic water bottles. We have calculated that this has reduced the need for over 1 million plastic bottles over the years. Amazing! But what have we, as a community, done since?

There are many ways we can take action to stop the horrendous path we are following; this can be as simple as planting more trees. We can choose to reduce our energy needs, improve our diet, recycle more often, eliminate pesticides, slow down on the roads at night and contribute to citizen science projects. Each of these actions take little effort which means that we aren't asking for much to change our world to be the best in recorded history!

A couple of ways to reduce energy include turning the lights off when you leave the room or turning off power points when you're not using them. Add solar panels to your roof to save money and also save the environment. Solar panels take energy from the sun and that energy can be converted and used all around your house. Imagine if we all had electric cars. When you drive a combustion engine car, it releases toxic fumes that are bad for the environment. Without petrol cars the environment would be much better. We have water refill stations in our town. Why can't we have car charging stations for electric cars too?

Our diet is an important part of a healthy life, so important that we have been learning how to grow and cook our own food. We have followed recipes and made such delicious food! The ingredients we used in our cooking were simple items you could find in your fridge and leftovers from other things you might have made so we avoided food waste. This is important as food has never been so expensive! We made French toast, pancakes, veggie fritters, salad burgers and fruit skewers. We will be harvesting our garlic at Remembrance Day and making garlic bread and garlic pizza. We have also completed a multicultural cooking assignment where everyone brought in a plate to share, along with it's recipe and place of origin. Later this term we will be using our cooking skills to have a breakfast banquet to raise money for a school in a developing community in Nepal. We've learnt that saving food saves money and resources, while eating healthier by eating less meat is healthier for the planet.

We can recycle better too. We did recycle soft plastic at school, at home and in our daily lives, but we don't now. When we recycle soft plastic, it doesn't just go to







waste but can be used to make other things, reducing the amount of plastic going into the ocean and therefore also reducing the death rates of our fellow mammals and sea creatures. It's not too late to start recycling again.

Don't use fly spray! It doesn't just kill flies and mozzies, it kills you! Pesticides kill us because the spray doesn't care if it kills just the flies and mozzies or if it kills all the insects in the entire environment. When you use fly spray, it kills all the insects in the area so that other animals, such as spiders, frogs, lizards, birds and other small mammals, don't have any more food. So instead of using poisons that kill everything, use things like Aerogard which don't kill insects, but repel them instead. Don't use chemicals that kill insects which are so important to the ecosystem! We need these insects to pollinate our crops. Protecting the insects protects the grass, the trees and all the animals, including us.

Another thing we can do is to look after our wildlife. Slow down on the roads when animals are about. We have a sign on our classroom window that says "I go 70km/h dusk to dawn". None of us drive yet but it won't be long before we do. In the meantime, we're passengers and we look out of the window where we see many dead animals. When was the last time you drove to Moss Vale and did not see a dead animal? How many animals are killed because we are driving too fast to stop in time? We can also help animals by helping to support local wildlife carers, like so many of us do for Wombat John at Wombat Care Bundanoon.

Do you have a Wildlife Watering Station at your place? We do at school, along with several small ponds. We can also join in citizen science projects that monitor what animals are out there. Did you know that BirdLife Australia's Aussie Bird Count survey found nearly four million birds in one week? We helped BirdLife Australia develop an understanding of local birds whilst getting to know the wildlife on our doorstep.

We can also plant more trees. Our school has been planting trees every year since we have been in kindergarten. Even though none of our trees were burnt in the bushfires, it seems that we have less trees now than when we started and this problem is getting worse, with more trees in our school grounds dying. Planting trees is the simplest solution to make an impact on climate change. Trees can remove carbon from the atmosphere, cool our cities and suburbs, stabilise our rapidly eroding landscape and provide habitat for wildlife.

We need a new normal, one where we can investigate the environment and find that it is in the best condition in recorded history, where it is appreciated, respected and sustainably managed. As we head into high school in the new year, we are hopeful that simple actions can have a huge impact. We ask you, what can you do to create a wonderful future?

I also enjoyed learning about foraging or buying from trusted indigenous companies. It was very informative and whilst the majority of bush tucker was familiar, there were some little gems or recipes many of us had never heard mentioned before. This was enhanced

The alarm that my husband had been carrying for over 10 years buzzed loudly. It was 11pm and we'd been sleeping soundly. He picked it up and we looked at each other with a mixture of hope and shock.

Henk had been on dialysis for 8yrs and on the transplant list for over 10. He'd been off the list a few times due to health issues and the percentages were against him due to his matching parameters. We lived in hope, but our expectations decreased as the years past.

He put the phone on speaker and dialled the number he'd been carrying for all those years. The alarm had buzzed before, but always during the day, when the hospital was testing. Each time, he dialled in anticipation. This time, he gave his name and was put through to a renal nurse.

"Mr Janssen,
we have a kidney.
Do you want it"?

You may think that the response would be a resounding "YES", but there was hesitation. He was relatively healthy and coping with dialysis. We'd been working with his renal specialist for years and knew of the risks associated with transplantation.

After a short talk, he accepted, and we packed and headed to the hospital for assessment. It was over 10hrs of anxious waiting before the approval was given for the operation.

It's been twenty-three years since that night and Henk is one of the longest living transplant recipients. Years that have been spent working, raising our family, being able to holiday more than 2hrs from a renal unit and now enjoying a retirement he didn't expect to see.

Henk received the gift of life from an incredibly generous donor and their family. Truly the greatest gift of all.



UNMASKING THE ENIGMA

The hidden symptoms of sleep apnoea

Risk factors for sleep apnoea:

Being overweight

Older age

Alcohol

Some thyroid diseases

Some medications like sedatives

Nasal congestion and obstruction

Facial bone shape

Large tonsils and adenoids, which may cause sleep apnoea in children

Diagnosis:

A definitive diagnosis of sleep apnoea typically involves a sleep study.

Common Managements:

- ➡ Lifestyle Modifications: Adopting a healthy lifestyle can often be the first line of defence. This includes maintaining a regular sleep schedule, avoiding alcohol and sedatives, losing weight if needed, and sleeping on your side rather than your back.
- → Continuous Positive Airway Pressure (CPAP): This is one of the most effective treatments for obstructive sleep apnoea. It involves wearing a mask over the nose and/or mouth during sleep, which delivers a steady stream of air pressure to keep the airways open.
- → Oral Appliances: These are devices fitted by a dentist or orthodontist that help keep the airway open by repositioning the jaw and tongue during sleep.
- Surgery: In severe cases or when other treatments fail, surgery may be considered to remove excess tissue, correct structural abnormalities, or implant a device to support the airway.

Early recognition and appropriate management of sleep apnoea are crucial for improving sleep quality, reducing associated health risks, and enhancing overall well-being.

Confessions of a Rail Fan

I always thought a 'rail fan' was someone who knew timetables, trains, engines, railcars off by heart. Their habitat was platforms and beside tracks clutching a notebook and telephoto lens camera. Coming back on the wonderful Winterfest Heritage Rail Motor short tour, a fellow traveller diagnosed me, "Andy, I think you are a rail fan".

Yes, I do know roughly the times of the thrice daily each way Sydney – Canberra service and I recognise the sound of the non-stopping twice daily Sydney – Melbourne XPT. Dare I confess I find the sound of the front and back grumbling engines a lovely sound? Perhaps not.

For those living in Bundanoon, we should take advantage of our rail service. At the Heritage listed Bundanoon Station we can travel easily between Sydney and Canberra. For those with a NSW Seniors card, there is also a bargain to be had. How does travelling anywhere south of Bundanoon on the rail network for only \$2.50 a day sound? Canberra return in a day only \$2.50? Albury via Goulburn only \$2.50. Stay overnight in Canberra and it is \$2.50 each way -\$5.00 for a return overnight trip.

With a Seniors Card, you are eligible for the Country Pensioners Excursion fare. You do not need to be receiving a pension, only hold a NSW Seniors Card. The "catch" is that it is only for southbound travel from Bundanoon and only when you book within a week of travel.

If you have time and want to save money, even Bundanoon to Melbourne for \$7.50 each way is possible. The booked train to Goulburn, then the XPT to Albury is \$2.50 on the Excursion fare. Then a bit over a 2 hour wait at Albury for the late afternoon regional Victorian service. It adds three hours but can be done – I know because I've done it!

For people travelling either way between Sydney and Canberra, Bundanoon is a great tourist stop-off to spend a morning/lunch before carrying on to their destination. I like to think of Bundanoon as the new "Central" on the Bundanoon tourist railway. I have created a small website BundanoonOnTrack.com.au to promote our wonderful town.

Throughout the year visitors arrive in Bundanoon to together with its residents celebrate and enjoy the abundance that its gardens and landscapes provide. The gardeners of Bundanoon generously give of their time and produce sharing what they have achieved. Note that most of our visitors are welcome but there are a few that we have to learn to live with. Think snails, wombats, aphids and some birds that destroy what has been planted. Fortunately our gardeners share their knowledge on how to intelligently and kindly deal with such problems.

The sharing of our gardens in a myriad of ways means that walks, or even drives, through our village are pleasurable. Whilst I walk to the village I enjoy what other gardeners have achieved. Some gardens proudly show everything to the passer by whilst others reveal only an enticing glimpse. It is fortunately rare to see a garden completely hidden from public view behind a high fence, wall or hedge. At various times of the year generous gardeners open their gardens to the public, think of the annual Bundanoon Garden Ramble that has been held since 1990s and this year celebrates its twenty fifth ramble. Other clubs and societies, such as the Bundanoon Garden Club, arrange for member visits to various gardens.

Excess garden produce is often given away, especially in times of a glut. In the citrus season limes, oranges and lemons can be found displayed on grass verges, at various club meetings and even the butcher has a display which reads 'Free Lemons'. Various social media sites and club notice boards advertise free produce available for the picking, such as home grown blackberries when in season. Excess trees and shrubs are offered for free or for a reasonable sum. Recipients and buyers benefit because they are receiving locally produced plants and gardeners have the satisfaction of giving away their produce or receiving a financial reward for their efforts.

A recent initiative to launch a way of sharing produce has been launched by Lisa Stuart who runs the Bundanoon Makers Market. This market is open on the first and third Sundays of each month, alternating between the Public school grounds and the Memorial Hall. The plan is to provide an outlet for garden produce from local gardens, including produce that has been grown by children. Produce is then sold to residents and visitors alike. A long time service is provided by the Good Yarn shop that also sells garden produce including seasonal flowers, fruit and vegetables and jams and pickles that are made from local produce.

It is a pleasure to see how many of us benefit from the produce and sharing that the gardeners provide. I am now about to enjoy the kind gift of a neighbour's lemons and make a batch of marmalade. Then a walk to the village. I anticipate the warmth of the sun, the perfume of roses, the sounds of the birds and the gift of another summer in Bundanoon.










Bertie McMahon
